SUBJECT: DISCUSSION ITEMS

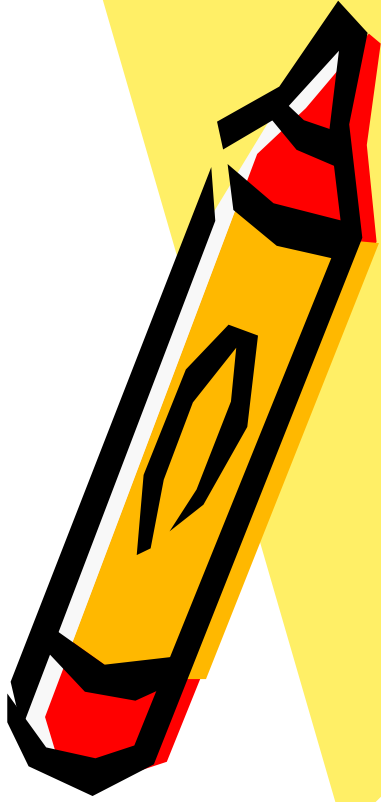

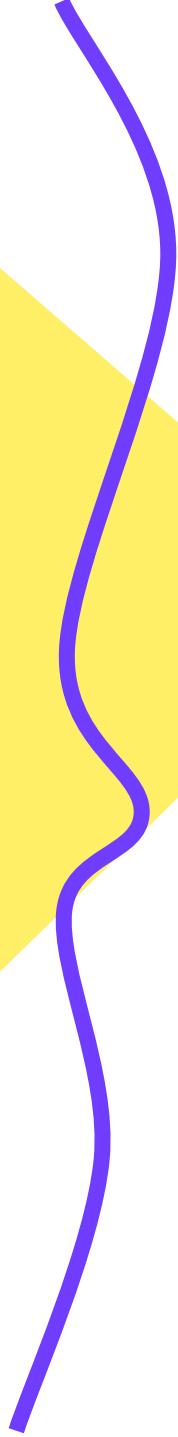

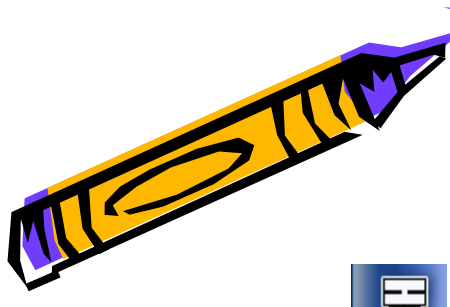


What is Children's Special Health Care Services?



CSHCS is a program of the Michigan Department of Community Health (MDCH) and of Ottawa County Health Department.

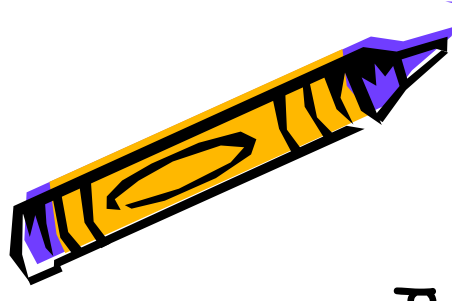
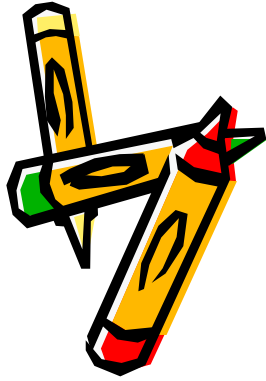
CSHCS helps children and some adults who need specialty medical care. CSHCS assists families by providing a range of support services.



CSHCS Funding

CSHCS is funded by both state and federal dollars and at the local level by county dollars. Each year, Michigan lawmakers fund CSHCS through the MDCH Appropriations Act. The Michigan law that governs children with special health care needs is Part 58 of the Public Health Code (Act 368 of 1978).

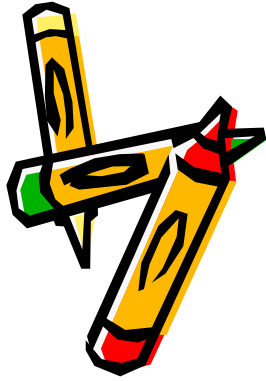
Federally, CSHCS receives funding from Title V of the Social Security Act. Each year, federal lawmakers fund all Title V programs in every state through the Maternal and Child Health Block.



How CSHCS Helps

Services provided by CSHCS help in many ways, including:

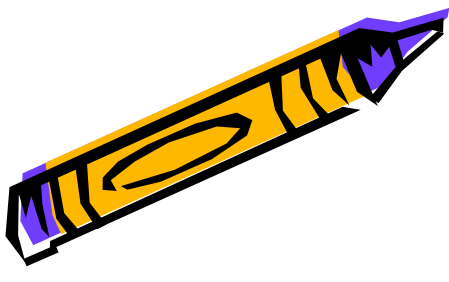
- Paying specialty medical bills
- Coordinating services from multiple providers
- Educating about specialty providers such as doctors, hospitals, and clinics
- Coordinating health insurance benefits
- Covering co-pays or deductibles
- **CSHCS works to provide the very best care.**



CSHCS Eligibility Factors

Several factors decide whether a person is eligible for Children's Special Health Care Services (CSHCS). These factors are:

- Medical Condition
- Residency
- Citizenship
- Age



Financial Factors

It is important to note that financial factors do not count in determining CSHCS eligibility. In fact, families at every income level are in the CSHCS program.

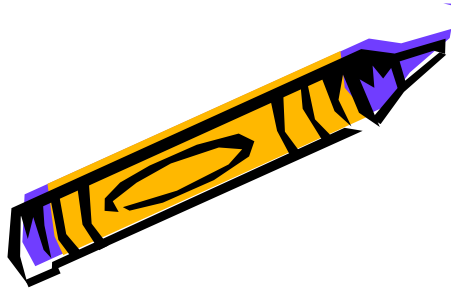
It is a myth that families with private health insurance are not eligible. The parents of many children with CSHCS coverage have private health insurance. CSHCS provides additional help to these families.



Medical Conditions Covered by CSHCS

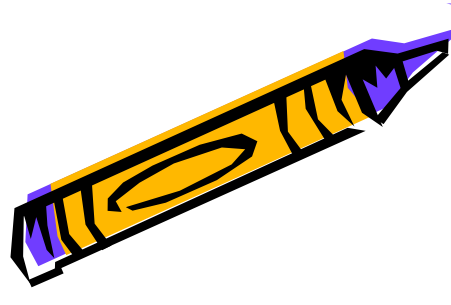
CSHCS covers about 2,500 health problems. Four factors determine if a condition is covered by CSHCS:

- Diagnosis
- Chronicity
- Severity
- Need for treatment by a physician specialist



Medically Eligible Conditions

- Examples of medically eligible conditions are:
- Cerebral Palsy
- Sensorneural Hearing Loss
- Asthma
- Diabetes
- Convulsive Epilepsy
- Respiratory Distress Syndrome
- Sickle-Cell Anemia
- Cleft Lip and Palate
- Congenital Quadriplegia
- Anomalies of Skull/Face bones

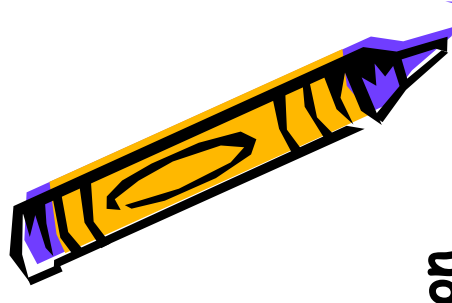


When Found Eligible

When found eligible, the family receives an Application Packet. The Application Packet includes the following key items:

- An invitation-to-join letter
- A CSHCS Application form
- Income Review/Payment Agreement
- The CSHCS Family Guide

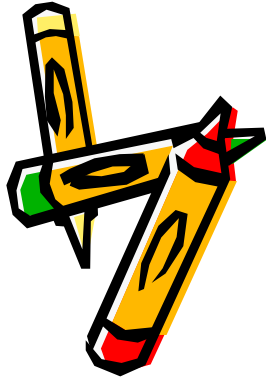
The local Health Department staff assist families to enroll.



Income Review/Payment Agreement

Michigan's Public Health Code requires CSHCS to consider the ability of families to contribute to the cost of their child's CSHCS care.

The amount a family may be asked to pay varies from family to family and is based on each family's circumstances. There is no fee to join for those enrolled in Michigan Medicaid, WIC, and MIChild. All other enrollees pay to join.

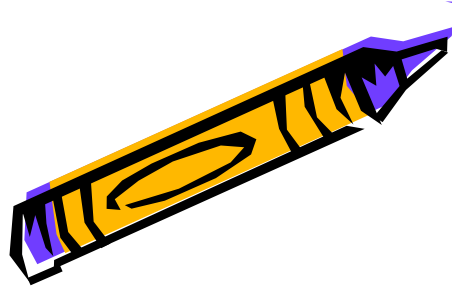
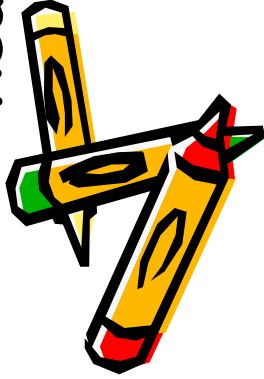




Nursing Services

- Reassessment of client's status and needs



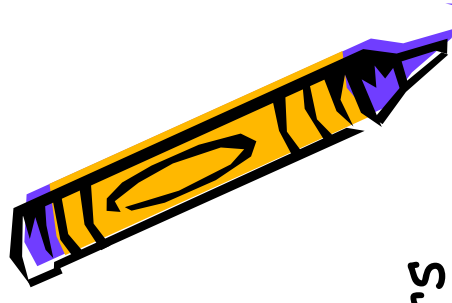
2008-09 Local Data

- 223 new enrollees this year

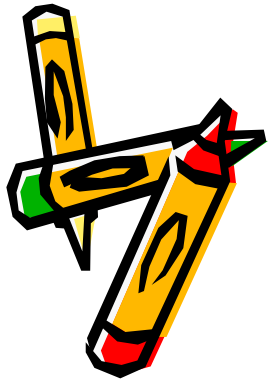


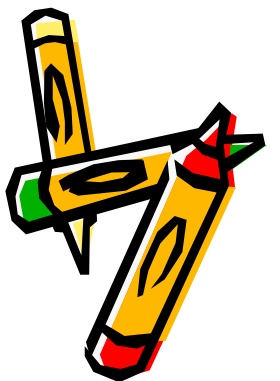
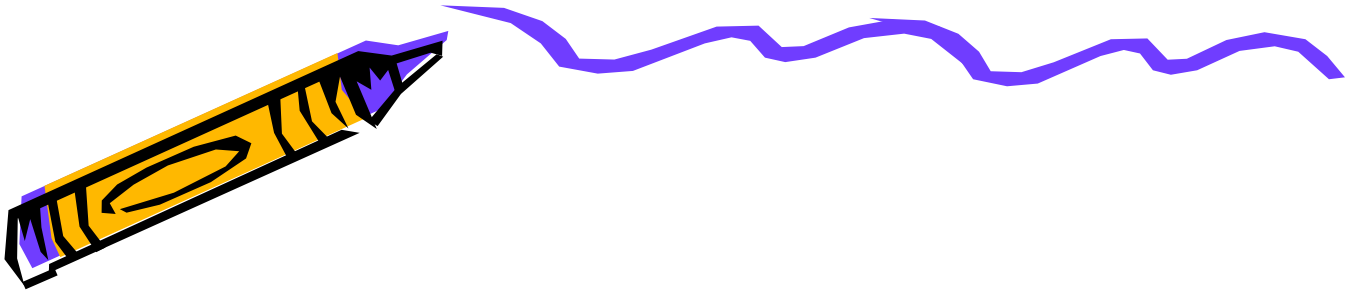
Parent Survey March 2010

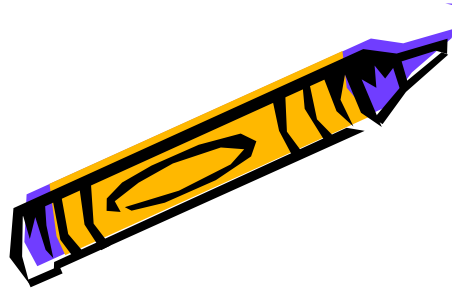

Weatherization Program





The multiple benefits of weatherization:

- ✓ Promotes financial stability
- ✓ Encourages personal responsibility
- ✓ Enhances the community
- ✓ Boosts the local economy
- ✓ Reduces energy use, pollution & climate change

We work on many types of homes

- Single family
- Mobile Homes
- Multi-family



Eligibility Criteria

Family Size	Maximum Annual Income (annualized based on prior 3 months)
1	\$ 23,446
2	\$ 30,661
3	\$ 37,785
4	\$ 45,089 (add \$7,480 for each additional member)

A household is automatically eligible if any household member received any of the following payments at any time during the past 12 months:

- DHS Cash Assistance (FIP)
- SDA
- SSI

Application procedure

- Pull name off the wait list and reassess
- Do application (bring needed items)
- Attend Energy Ed. Class
- Pre-inspection
- Contractor work
- Post-inspection



Common weatherization measures:

- **Insulation Installation**
 - Attic, Walls, Floor, Ducts, Pipes, & Water Heater
- **Air Sealing**
 - Caulking, Weather-stripping & Storm Windows
- **Heating & Modifications**
 - Furnace Tuning & Replacement
- **Electric Base Load Measure Improvements**
 - Lighting (CFL's installed), Refrigerators, Water Heaters
- **Energy-Related Health & Safety Improvements (gas leaks, CO₂, venting, etc)**

Ottawa County Production Goals:

- An average of 60 - 80 Ottawa County homes have been weatherized each year through 2008
- 400 - 600 homes are projected to be weatherized beginning in 2009 through 2012



Economic Impact

- Thousands of jobs are supported nationally through weatherization funding
- 16-20 full time jobs supported locally
- Approximately \$1 million in materials & supplies will be purchased annually from local suppliers by program contractors

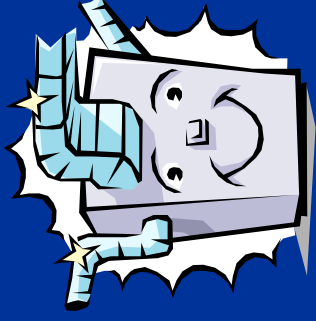
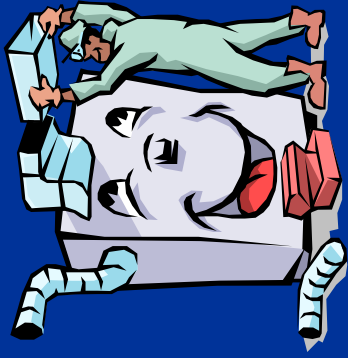
