SUBJECT: DISCUSSION ITEMS

- 1. Ottawa County Department of Public Health Update-Kristina Wieghmink gave a COVID-19 response presentation on the many methods she uses to get information out to the community. She highlighted what she focuses on for Risk Communications and the importance of communication, along with the partnerships she works with. She then talked about the tools she uses and used during this pandemic to effectively communicate with the community. The last thing she talked about what the multi-media methods she uses.
- 2. Department Updates
- a. Community Mental Health-Lynne Doyle said they have been very busy with grant writing and submissions. She updated on one that has been taking up a lot of their time that they recently submitted. It is a CCBHC grant. She explained what this is. She is hopeful they will get it. They are also hiring a lot of new staff because of grants they have secured recently. Some very good news is that the supplemental has been approved for direct care workers for a wage increase.

She then updated that the LRE has hired a new CEO and they are also making improvements with finances and negotiations with the State Department.

- b. Community Action Agency-Jen Brozowski gave an update on the Walk for Warmth totals. They currently have hit \$8,600 and they received word that they will be getting \$3,000 from Semco. They have been busy preparing for the CERA grant, which is a \$9,800,000 grant for eviction diversion. They will be involved in the utility assistance portion of the grant which for Ottawa County is \$100,000. They were also awarded more dollars in the CARES act to prepare quarantine kits. There is also an ESG grant they are working on trying to get.
- c. Public Health Department- Dr Heidel updated there has been a recent listeria outbreak from contaminated cheese. He said they are working closely with Tulip Time and Coast Guard festivals, as well as schools, for proms and graduations. They are also concerned right now with the new strains of COVID out there. They are keeping a close eye on this. They have had one outbreak at a school that they are also keeping an eye on. He said that they are in constant contact with schools and that there are 5 superintendents retiring at the end of this school year.

Lisa Stefanovsky-she updated that today they are hosting the largest clinic yet, with over 2,000 appointments at the Civic Center. They have vaccinated about 59% of people 65 and older with at least their first dose of the vaccine. They are having issues getting to them. They are brainstorming ways to reach this population. She also updated that tomorrow the Community Needs Assessment results will be released to the public at a zoom forum. She encourages everyone to sign up for the forum.

d. Department of Human Services – Kendra Spanjer had the answers to a couple of questions the commissioners had asked her at the Board meeting yesterday regarding Medicaid and CPS reports from schools. She also updated that they are currently planning on opening their office and lobby to the public in May. This could change at any time.

CSHCS is a program within the Michigan Department of Health & Human Services

find, diagnose and treat children, and some adults, in Michigan who have chronic illnesses or disabling conditions

CSHCS is mandated by the Michigan Public Health Code, Public Act 368 of 1978

cshcs was developed in cooperation with the Federal Government under Title V of the Social Security Act through the Maternal and Child Health Services

CSHCS Medical Diagnoses



CSHCS has over 2,700 medically-eligible conditions! Here are just a few examples:

- Cleft Lip and Palate
- Asthma
- Hydrocephalus
- Sickle-Cell Anemia
- Metabolic Disorders
- Cerebral Palsy
- Leukemia, Lymphoma and other cancers
- Cardiac conditions
- Diabetes

- Epilepsy
- Anomalies of Skull/Face Bones
- Cystic Fibrosis
- Congenital Quadriplegia
- Blood Clotting Disorders
- Hearing Loss
- Respiratory Distress Syndrome
- Zika Virus
- NEW with COVID-19: (MIS-C)

Medical Eligibility Factors for CSHCS



Medical Diagnosis:

- There must be a CSHCS qualifying medical diagnosis*
- An individual may qualify with more than one CSHCS medical diagnoses
- * NOTE: Developmental delays, mental and intellectual disabilities are <u>NOT</u> qualifying conditions for CSHCS

2. Condition Severity:

Severity is assessed to determine the degree to which the condition affects the individual's life

3. Chronicity of Condition:

Specialty care is expected to continue for at least 12 months

4. Medical Specialist Treatment:

Treatment by a medical specialist is needed at least annually

Additional Eligibility Factors for CSHCS



Age: CSHCS covers qualifying medical diagnoses until a child's 21st birthday except in the case of Cystic Fibrosis and Hemophilia which qualify a person for life-time CSHCS coverage

Citizenship: Applicants must be a U.S. Citizen or legal permanent resident, though exceptions are made for children of migrant workers in Michigan

Residency: Applicants must be a Michigan resident, though every state has its own version of the CSHCS program

Note: Income does **NOT** affect eligibility for CSHCS, nor does having other health insurance

How to Apply for CSHCS



Step One: Determining Eligibility

- □ Obtain a <u>CSHCS Release of Information form</u> by contacting Brenda Kempf, Representative 616-393-4445 or <u>bkempf@miottawa.org</u>
- ☐ Give the signed CSHCS Release of Information to the medical specialist's office and ask them to send a medical report to CSHCS in Lansing:
 - Including medical condition(s) and the treatment plan to be followed
 - The specialist must have been seen within the past year

Step Two: Joining the Program

- □ An <u>Application to Join CSHCS</u> will be sent by Lansing once an individual is found eligible for the program
- ☐ To join CSHCS, fill out the 3-page application--including the financial form-and return it to Lansing

CSHCS Annual Fee



There is an annual fee to join CSHCS

The annual fee is determined by income & family size

The fee is waived for individuals with Medicaid, MIChild, or Healthy Michigan Plan

CSHCS Helps Families Financially



cshcs helps pay specialty medical bills:

- Related to the CSHCS qualifying condition(s)
- Including Copays & Deductibles
- Diagnostic visits to specialty care providers

CSHCS helps pay other expenses:

- Related to the CSHCS qualifying condition(s)
- Prescription medications & equipment
- Assistance with travel and lodging expenses

CSHCS coordinates
with other insurances,
Medicaid, and
COBRA:

- CSHCS does not affect eligibility under the ACA
- CSHCS may help pay health insurance premiums in some instances

Eligibility for CSHCS is NOT income-based:

- There is a fee to join CSHCS; it's determined by income & family size
- The fee is waived if the client receives Medicaid

Additional Ways CSHCS Helps Families



CSHCS Helps Caregivers:

- Coordinate insurance benefits
- Resolve billing issues
- Assist with arranging private duty nursing and applying for respite nursing care
- Connect with community agencies and resources
- Locate financial resources, such as scholarships & grants
- Apply to the Children with Special Needs (CSN) Fund
- Connect with other special needs families

CSHCS Nurses Also Help:


- Locate and provide information about specialty providers such as doctors, hospitals, and clinics
- Coordinate services from multiple providers and agencies
- Develop a Plan of Care (POC) to set goals for your child's health care and family's well-being
