## PROCEEDINGS

WATER RESOURCES COMM. JOE BUSH: Well good morning, everyone. Welcome to Holland Township Fire Department. We appreciate the masks. I just have mine down so you can hear me and the court reporter can hear me. So when we do talk, I assume we can remove the masks so the court recorder can get your name and address further down the road.

I'm Joe Bush, Water Resources Commissioner, also known as the Drain Commissioner. And we're here based on the Foxwood No. 1 Drain petition we got in.

A few years back Holland Township has been one to establish orphan drains in the township. An orphan drain is defined as a drain that nobody technically has any ownership of, the road commission, the county, me, neither does the township. So it's just lingering out there and it's just infrastructure that is there, but nobody technically owns it, not even your homeowner's association if you have one.

There is easements on them usually, but that doesn't mean anybody owns it even though there is an easement on it. It really is defined as an orphan.

Holland Township years ago said, hey, let's start establishing these under the county drain system so there is some accountability or responsibility of some ownership of

somebody to call when there is issues within your infrastructure.

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Right now who are you going to call? You call the road commission for something, and they're going to say, it's not technically ours. You call the Holland Township, and it's not really ours. Then you call me because everybody directs them to me, and I'm going to go, well, it's not really legally established. And what that means is nobody can really go in and touch it and fix it, it's really on the property owners.

Sometimes the property owner being affected isn't where the area of concern really is. It could be upstream, downstream, somewhere else.

So we're here today to have a Board of Determination and that's why we're here, having a public hearing.

These three gentlemen, they're actually appointed by me through Drain Code. So this is all through state law. It's nothing that Joe or the township puts in the policy or does anything. It's actually state law and it's Drain Code.

So the townships over the years have been petitioning me to establish these orphans. Some of them have issues, some of them do not.

And we're just taking them one at a time because there is a lot of them; not just in Holland Township, but I

cover the whole county so I have 17 townships and six cities and a village.

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So that being said, through the petition process they petitioned me and said, hey, let's have a Board of Determination, a public hearing, you appoint your board.

These three-panel board members have no affiliation with anything with Holland Township. They're not on the planning commission, they're not on the township board, nor do they have any properties in the said district we're talking about.

What is a drain district? Well you got a mailing because everybody lives in a watershed of some sort, everybody's water goes somewhere. And basically a drain district is a watershed.

So everybody gets a mailing, and they're like, why did I get a mailing and you didn't? Well maybe that house could be on the borderline. We try to mail to people who we think could be in, because at this time we take public testimony and we might hear different stories of, oh, back in 1990 there was a storm sewer put in by my neighbors and my water really goes that way and not this way. And that's why we have engineers here today to go verify that based on public testimony.

So what we know as the drain district today is what we know. If it changes, it could change, but the engineers

will verify that based on today's testimony.

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These three gentlemen are here to hear testimony and say there is a decision to be made, a motion at the end of our meeting to say there could be a possibility this will be under Joe's jurisdiction moving forward; or they could say, you know what, we don't see a need to do that.

It's not about a cost, there is not a project.

Some people get confused and say, wait a minute, they're spending money. I don't know there is a project. I don't think, from what I understand from the engineering firm, there is really issues in this Foxwood. It's been pretty quiet, there is not a project, there is no costs, there is no assessment.

Holland Township picks this cost up of today's court recorder and, you know, the publication in the paper and the engineering that has been provided. Holland Township picks that up at large. So it comes out of their budget that they put aside to establish orphan drains. So there is no cost for property owners today, as we know it, because we don't know of any problems. That could be different if there is an issue down the road.

So again, these three gentlemen will just hear testimony and say, yes, this should be under Joe's jurisdiction.

These three guys have done many of these BODs for

me in the past. So when I appoint them, I pick people again who have no properties, no investments or have anything related to the township.

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But I usually appoint people who understand, number one, Drain Code, and what their purpose is here today.

Number two, they understand township business because they've all either been involved at some point in their careers, or still are involved in their own township business, and they understand the petition process, the assessment process, Drain Code. And they understand most importantly, I think besides the petition process and Drain Code, is flooding or water problems. So they understand infrastructure.

So after I do introductions, I'll give these three gentlemen the oath and they'll run the meeting. Any questions, ask them, and I'm more than happy to answer them through that conversation. But again, the dialogue will be between you folks and the three gentlemen.

Again we have a court recorder, Marge is here. She's been doing these for many years for me. So again, this is not required by state law, but if we need to look back into something down the road, I can always go back on -- or you can too on my website on miottawa.org, look under Water Resources Commissioner. We post these at about four to six weeks after today's meeting. Typically we get those and I'll post them on the website.

If anybody wants to look at other BODs that we've had or other petitions or the process or anything like that. So we're very transparent.

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And it's not by law, but it's always been helpful that if people have, oh, what did I say back then, or what did the board members say, or what did the engineers say, or the township or road commission, it's always nice to go back and be able to read it word for word. It's not somebody's handwriting and interpretation. It's actually, she's basically typing what you're saying. So that's good for all of us down the road.

So again once I give them the oath, they'll run the meeting. Any questions, they'll be happy to answer them, or if they don't -- I'll go ahead and talk about our engineering firm is Prein & Newhof. We have Ken Bosma and Lucas Timmer.

And then we do have a Holland Township official with us today. And then Jerry Olman is here from the road commission. And then my staff, Sara and Josiah, you probably met those two folks when you came in, they're from my staff.

Again, I'll go ahead and introductions to our board. And from right to left we got Ken Souter, he's from Port Sheldon Township. He had 38 years in at the engineering department. He's retired from the road commission so he has a lot of the engineering background and he knows why we're here today and his purpose.

Then we have Mr. VanderKlok. Rich has been a board member in Georgetown Township, currently semi-retired, still busy. But he was on the Georgetown Township board for many years and has been involved in that board as well, the BOD board.

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The other one is Todd Wolters, he is the current supervisor at Olive Township just to the north of here and he has been on these BODs for many, many years as well.

So they have good experience, they understand their job today.

And again there is no project, there is no cost, but if there is issues that we hear today, we'll be more than happy to look into those. But Ken and Lucas would be the ones to talk to either during the meeting or afterwards, they'll stick around. We have three of these today and this is just the first one.

I'll go ahead and give these gentlemen the oath and then they'll run the meeting from there.

Gentlemen, please rise. Raise your right hand.

Do you each solemnly swear that you will faithfully perform and discharge the duties imposed upon you as required by law as members of the Board of Determination, appointed by the Ottawa County Water Resources Commissioner to determine the necessity to locate, establish, construct the proposed Foxwood No. 1 Drain located in Holland Charter Township in

1	Then the rules of public comment, those of you who
2	are here and of course we want to hear your comments, so we
3	will have we will allow three minutes for public comment.
4	And when you make your comments, if you would please stand
5	and state your name and your address, and then direct your
6	comments to the Chair.
7	And so I'll make a motion that we have public
8	comment three minutes.
9	BOARD SECRETARY KEN SOUTER: Second that motion.
10	BOARD MEMBER TODD WOLTERS: Three minutes per
11	person.
12	BOARD CHAIR RICH VANDER KLOK: So that's supported.
13	BOARD MEMBER TODD WOLTERS: Support.
14	BOARD CHAIR RICH VANDER KLOK: Supported.
15	All those in favor, say aye.
16	BOARD MEMBER TODD WOLTERS: Aye.
17	BOARD CHAIR RICH VANDER KLOK: Aye.
18	BOARD SECRETARY KEN SOUTER: Aye.
19	BOARD CHAIR RICH VANDER KLOK: That is carried.
20	We've already talked about the Joe has mentioned
21	the role and function of the board, and some of the
22	procedural history. And so I'd like to turn it over to
23	Lucas, who will give us a report from the engineering.
24	ENGINEER LUCAS TIMMER: Thank you, Rich.
25	My name is Lucas Timmer, I'm an engineer with Prein

& Newhof and we were hired to do the preliminary engineering work for the Foxwood No. 1 Drain.

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So as Joe mentioned at the beginning of the Board of Determination, the Foxwood No. 1 Drain is considered an orphan drain. So it's an existing storm water drain system that is without authorized local and county governmental jurisdiction and administrative, procedural and funding mechanisms to address current or future needs for maintenance and improvements.

So essentially this drain is considered an orphan or private, and Holland Township is taking the proactive approach with a lot of these orphan drain systems to get them established into the county drain system so that there is a way for the public to be involved in any future maintenance and improvements with the drain system.

So part of the county Drain Code is that to get this as a county drain, Holland Township filed a petition to establish a drainage district and they did this on May 20, 2021. And as Joe mentioned then what follows after that petition is that we have a Board of Determination meeting that you guys are at today.

So some of the preliminary engineering work that we did is we first reviewed utility drawings and plat maps. So we reviewed the record drawings of your storm sewer, your sanitary sewer and water mains just to get a good idea of

when that was all put in and get an idea on where high points and low points are located in your neighborhood roads.

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We also reviewed your plat maps. So Fox Wood was established as a plat in 1987.

We then used that information to delineate a drainage district. So a drainage district is essentially a watershed. A watershed then is anyone within that boundary contributes runoff to the storm water system that's being proposed to be a county drain. People on the outside then are considered not in the drainage district.

And we did that using GIS contour data and aerial data that we were able to receive from Ottawa County.

After we do that, we then visit the site to locate drain infrastructure and confirm drainage patterns.

So the next slide here shows the proposed drainage district. So this red line is our proposed drainage district or watershed. So everybody within this red boundary is considered contributing runoff to the storm sewer system.

This blue system here is considered the proposed county drain. So you can see that Fox Wood Trail, Gray Fox Court, Fox Fire Trail, all have storm sewer systems that end up discharging through a pipe towards the Brower Drain, which is that creek to the south of your neighborhood here.

These purple lines here are six-inch under drains.

OCWRC typically does not take in under drain as part of their

drain. Under drain is just used to serve the road to make sure the sand subbase has a way to drain underneath the road and get underneath the storm system.

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The next slide here just shows an aerial. We also have a map in the back that you guys can look at as well of the proposed drainage district and drain infrastructure.

So as the board mentioned, following our presentation we'll have a time for public testimony. At the end of public testimony, the board will then determine the necessity of the petition based on public health, welfare and/or convenience.

And if it's deemed necessary by the board that this becomes a county drain, then this existing, private, orphan system will become a county drain. If deemed not necessary by the board, then no further action will occur.

So for this slide I want to start with actually item number two. So Ken and I are not aware of any drainage issues in the subdivision, and we may find out from you guys today that there are drainage issues because you live there and you've been there when these big storm events happen.

So with the understanding that there is no drainage issues, and the board then, if they were to determine that this is necessary, as Joe mentioned, Holland Township then is going to pay for all the costs to get this established as a county drain and there would be no project.

Let's say though today we find out from you guys that there are extensive drainage issues in your neighborhood and you've noticed sinkholes or other flooding issues, and it's deemed necessary that there should be a project. We then go through this following project setup here.

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OCWRC then will have us review feasible projects to improve drainage. And once we do that we go through a design process, and this is how our flowchart is setup. We'll select a project, that project is usually something that makes sense. We're not going to do a Cadillac project when it requires a Yugo kind of fix.

We'll then do project design and survey. We'll go through easement acquisitions if it's at all necessary to obtain easements. We then go through project bid and construction.

And then the final step of that is a Day of Review of Apportionment. So if there is a project or any sort of future project, assessments then are made out to Ottawa County and the Ottawa County Road Commission. They're made out to Holland Township, but they're also made to people within the drainage district. So the property owners that are within the district all pay a portion of those project costs.

And then moving onto if there are drainage issues in the future. So if there are drainage issues in the

future, a petition will be needed from you guys if it's an 1 2 extensive drainage issue. So this petition will then be 3 either filed by the property owners or Holland Township, and 4 we'll have a Board of Determination similar to what we have 5 today. 6 If we find out there is a drainage issue and it's a 7 small problem, let's say a small sinkhole by a catch basin, so less than \$5,000 per mile, Joe's office then has the 8 9 ability then to go without a petition and a Board of 10 Determination and just take care of the fix. And that fix 11 then ultimately or any future maintenance will then be 12 assessed out to Ottawa County, the road commission, Holland 13 Township and property owners. 14 So that's the end of my presentation. 15 BOARD CHAIR RICH VANDER KLOK: Okay, thank you, 16 Lucas. 17 I want to ask if Ken or Todd have any questions for 18 the engineer? 19 BOARD SECRETARY KEN SOUTER: Not at this point. 2.0 BOARD CHAIR RICH VANDER KLOK: Todd? 2.1 BOARD MEMBER TODD WOLTERS: 22 BOARD CHAIR RICH VANDER KLOK: Then I wonder, 23 Jerry, you're back there from the road commission. Anything 24 from the road commission? 25 ROAD COMMISSION JERRY Olman: As far as I know, we

haven't had any issues with the drainage system under the 1 2 roads. 3 And as far as the road commission goes, the road 4 commission would be in favor of establishing the district and 5 bringing the system into the water resource control. 6 BOARD CHAIR RICH VANDER KLOK: Okay, thank you, 7 Jerry. Anything from Holland Township? 8 9 HOLLAND TOWNSHIP FIN. DIRECTOR DOUG KUIPER: 10 At the township we're systematically seeking to bring all the 11 orphan drains under the jurisdiction of the Water Resources 12 Commissioner, as Joe noted, and that is the reason for the 13 petition before you today. 14 BOARD CHAIR RICH VANDER KLOK: Okay. Thank you. 15 Then we'll go to our public comment time. 16 again, you have three minutes, and address your comments to 17 the chair. Just stand and state your name and your address 18 and then make your comments. 19 And I think what we'll do is we'll start way over 2.0 there if you have a comment, sir? 2.1 UNKNOWN SPEAKER: No. 22 BOARD CHAIR RICH VANDER KLOK: Ma'am? 23 UNKNOWN SPEAKER: Not at present. I think I'd like 24 to listen to what other people say first. 25 BOARD CHAIR RICH VANDER KLOK: Okay. Well, sir,

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1	BOARD CHAIR RICH VANDER KLOK: We can have Lucas
2	respond to that.
3	ENGINEER LUCAS TIMMER: So the under drain, it's a
4	six-inch pipe that's put in. It's often put in for roads
5	that are in clay areas.
6	MR. JEFF STARK: Okay.
7	ENGINEER LUCAS TIMMER: So essentially your
8	neighborhood I'm assuming is all clay.
9	MR. JEFF STARK: Yes.
10	ENGINEER LUCAS TIMMER: So it's put in the sand
11	that's part of that road to make sure that sand underneath
12	the road is able to drain through that pipe. So that's the
13	purpose of the under drain.
14	MR. JEFF STARK: Okay.
15	ENGINEER LUCAS TIMMER: Does that make sense?
16	MR. JEFF STARK: Yes.
17	BOARD CHAIR RICH VANDER KLOK: Okay. Ma'am?
18	MS. MARGIE VELDHEER: Margie Veldheer, 3131 Gray
19	Fox Court.
20	And we do have a problem from 3131 to the north, to
21	the end to the road, there is a problem in our backyards.
22	BOARD CHAIR RICH VANDER KLOK: And the problem is
23	you're saying flooding or water not draining?
24	MS. MARGIE VELDHEER: It's not draining. People
25	have built their lawns up and it goes like this (indicating).

I mean not to that point, but so -- and then at the end of 1 2 the cul-de-sac, on the left-hand side, that -- if you even 3 drive by on the road, you can see there is a big dent with 4 overgrown grass and stuff where it's just -- where water 5 pools. 6 So I would think probably our backyards along there 7 is the biggest problem. BOARD CHAIR RICH VANDER KLOK: 8 Okay. 9 MR. MARGIE VELDHEER: There is a drain, and I don't 10 really understand why, back to 3131 going south, the next 11 house has a culvert and then there is a drain. So they don't have a problem. But if that drain gets, particularly if that 12 13 drain gets clogged, then we really have a big problem. 14 BOARD CHAIR RICH VANDER KLOK: Okay. 15 Now let's go back --16 MR. GARN EVANS: My name is Garn Evans, I'm at 3145 17 Gray Fox. 18 And to the point that was just made, there is that 19 spur that comes up between the properties that adjoin in the 2.0 back of my yard, there is also standing water, even now. So 2.1 I don't know where the water comes from, but given that we 22 haven't had a whole lot of water recently, there is still 23 standing water in the backs of those homes. 24 BOARD CHAIR RICH VANDER KLOK: Okav.

MR. GARN EVANS: And I quess this is an annex of

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1	this drain system into the Holland Township; as we anticipate					
2	maybe extending that spur or something, I'd be interested in					
3	that discussion.					
4	BOARD CHAIR RICH VANDER KLOK: All right. Good.

22	3105 on the corner there is a spur that goes in between 3100					
23	and 3105, is that correct?					
24	ENGINEER LUCAS TIMMER: That's correct, yes.					
25	BOARD MEMBER TODD WOLTERS: Okay. So for those					

folks' issue potentially that would be extended from there to get across more of the backyards?

ENGINEER LUCAS TIMMER: Correct. That's a possible way to improve. Yep. We'd have to look at it first.

BOARD MEMBER TODD WOLTERS: Okay.

BOARD SECRETARY KEN SOUTER: Well pretty much I'm in favor of always getting these systems under someone's control. And I understand there is some surface issue problems there that could be maybe addressed once it's under someone's control. But at this point, it's out in limbo land and there is no one to go to.

So basically I'm totally in favor of getting these systems under the Drain Commissioner's, or Water Resources Commissioner's jurisdiction. I can't see any other way to get things done, if you need things done.

So I'm in favor.

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BOARD CHAIR RICH VANDER KLOK: Okay. I think the point that Todd made with reference to your issues, the way to -- that that would then be addressed would be to bring it into the jurisdiction of the Water Resources Commissioner.

So I would make a motion that the location, establishment and construction of the Foxwood No. 1 Drain is necessary for, and conducive to public health, convenience and welfare.

So I'll make that motion. Is that supported?

BOARD SECRETARY KEN SOUTER: I'll second it. 1 2 BOARD CHAIR RICH VANDER KLOK: Okay. It's moved 3 and supported. 4 Those in favor, say aye. BOARD MEMBER TODD WOLTERS: 5 Aye. 6 BOARD CHAIR RICH VANDER KLOK: Ave. 7 BOARD SECRETARY KEN SOUTER: Aye. BOARD CHAIR RICH VANDER KLOK: That's carried. 8 9 And the only other information that I'd like Joe to 10 share is in regard to the appeal process and final comments. 11 WATER RESOURCES COMM. JOE BUSH: Correct. So to appeal it, you can appeal today's Board of Determination. I 12 13 got to mention this in every meeting because it's in Drain 14 Code. You can appeal today's decision with the Circuit 15 Court. You got ten days starting today if somebody would so 16 chose to do that. 17 Again final comments are, I appreciate you coming. 18 I'm glad we -- this is why we have these in case we don't 19 know about some certain issues, especially in backyards. Out 2.0 of sight, out of mind. People probably drive by 100th and 2.1 Riley and you don't even see it but it's in people's 22 backyards. 23 So we'll have the engineers look into that 24 situation, maybe take some survey and just see what we got in 25 the backyards, so we do appreciate you bringing that up.

So some people say, well how did this not become a county drain when it was developed? Well from about 2007 to currently, especially since I've been in office in the last two terms, I'm on my third term now, we make sure that every developer follows the standards and we establish these kind of drain systems right when they're getting reviewed through my department, through my office.

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So everything that's been developed basically, I won't say fell through the cracks, a lot of them did in 2007, 2008, but everything is under my jurisdiction as far as subdivisions go.

It's called a 433 Agreement. The developer participates in that, and that's all done and they get approved through the township, so through the planning commission, through the board, approvals in the plat process. So people are like, oh, that's how it's done.

And back years ago that all didn't get done. It's nobody's fault, it just wasn't part of the process in the legal things that should have been done. But we're trying to make that right for people who live there today or in the future or who have been there for a long time and had issues and never knew who to call. We want to make sure we provide a customer service that we can come out and assist and have some kind of ability to fix them.
