PROCEEDINGS

WATER RESOURCES COMM. JOE BUSH: Well good morning everyone. My name is Joe Bush, the Ottawa County Water Resources Commissioner, also known as drain commissioner. The title changed back in, when I got elected in 2012. So this is the water resources, still the same department.

And so I appreciate you guys being here, to listen to the, I think this is the Surry Oak Drain Board of Determination. The reason we have these Boards of Determinations and the reason why we're here at the fire barn is to -- we got to receive a petition along the Surry Oak Drain which, a petition means I need to hold a Board of Determination and hear of any issues or conflicts or water problems in the said drain district. That's why you got a mailing list, or a mailer, because in the mailing list is the watershed and you live in the drain district.

And these petitions have been coming in from Holland Township over the years. We usually do five, six, maybe seven of these orphan drains, we call them. This is one of the orphan drains on the list. Holland Township has been dwindling these down over the years, and we try to do up to maybe ten a year of orphans.

An orphan means the county drain officer, or water

resources commissioner, the township, or the road commission has really no ownership of the infrastructure, whether it's in the street or a side yard or a backyard or the outlet, and it was brought to our attention this is one of the ones that needed to be taken care of and brought under my jurisdiction.

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In order to have that, to be a county drain, the first step in Drain Code is to have a Board of Determination.

And that's our first step.

Well the first step is the petition. Once we get a petition, then we have a public hearing. And then I pick a three-panel Board and these three-panel Board members, these three especially have done quite a few of these over the years.

I usually, number one, I pick people who cannot, by law, live in the said drain district or in that township. So these three gentlemen do not live within the said drain district that we're talking about today, nor do they live in the township.

When it comes to picking a three-panel Board, again this is all through Drain Code, I pick people who know drains, drain history, know drain law pretty well. Over the years they've gotten to know what their job role is.

We're not here for a project. We're not here for a cost of a project. The township picks up today's costs because this is part of their program. So Holland Township,

who is here, and I'll do introductions in a second, they pick up the costs for this because they like to see it under my jurisdiction. Because at some point this infrastructure will fail somewhere, sometime, whether it's a sink hole in the road, or whether it's in somebody's backyard and there is a plugged culvert. It's always an issue with infrastructure when it comes to getting to its age of needing some repairs or at least looked at. So that's why Holland Township is doing this.

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Other townships are doing it as well, tackling these orphan drains so they don't become a problem down the road or flood somebody's basement.

So I pick the three-panel Board, we're here today.

And I always have a court reporter, so Margie has done a lot of these for me over the years.

And then we always have an engineer presentation, it's going to being short and sweet because there is not a lot of infrastructure, it's not a really big watershed, and we don't really know of any issues, that's we know of.

That's why we hold a Board of Determination, for the public to bring something to our awareness that, oh, there is an issue.

But as of right now we don't have a project because they have to vote, by the end of the meeting, whether to make a motion to put this under my jurisdiction or not.

So it's not me just going, oh, hey, Joe wants to take this over. No, there is a whole Drain Code and a whole law process that we follow.

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That being said, we're always -- there is a public comment time, and if there is issues, that's why we hold these, we want to make that known, and let this Board know that, to help them make that decision. Not just because it's an orphan, but if there is issues, then we definitely need to be looking into those.

Currently right now, if you have infrastructure and it's not a 9-1-1 in the middle of the road where the road commission might go out and temporarily fix it, there is no mechanism or no way to fix it. It's under nobody's jurisdiction, unless it's 9-1-1 and it's a sink hole and the road is closed. Then the road commission might, under emergency situations, fix it, but technically they don't really have jurisdiction over it because the infrastructure is taking on private and public water.

So that being said, once I give these three gentlemen the oath, they'll run the meeting. They'll pick a chair and secretary and run through all the legal things.

And then during the public testimony, please speak your name and address so the court reporter -- because these are always on my website. In about four to six weeks after today's meeting, you can always read them word for word.

I do a court recorder because, it's not required by law, but I do it for your protection as property owners, the township, the county, the road commission, these three gentlemen.

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It's nice to know what was said. Sometimes typically these are bigger meetings than what we have today, and sometimes these are large issues. We want to make sure they're recorded and they're known, so we can go back and listen and read it and figure out what was said, or what did they say.

So at this time, I'll go ahead and do introductions. Again, I'm Joe Bush, the Water Resources Commissioner. We have some of my staff, we have Marie who was signing people in. We have Josiah, my chief deputy, and Marie is my secretary.

We have Steve Bulthuis, the Manager of Holland
Township. He's the one that's been kind of running this
program of getting these orphans established because there is
a lot of drains, I have a thousand county drains. It's hard
to keep track of all of them.

And if there is an orphan, they're on the bottom of the priority list most of the time. So the township and the township board has been very proactive in trying to get those under my jurisdiction for future maintenance.

And then we have Jerry Olman from the road

commission who usually comes to all the Boards of Determinations as well.

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And then we have the engineering firm, Prein & Newhof, we have Lucas Timmer and Ken Bosma. They'll do a little presentation on kind of the area, some of the history on it.

And then we have our three panel Board members. We got Howard Baumann, who is the current supervisor of Port Sheldon Township, only for about a week and a half, and he'll be retiring.

We have Rich VanderKlok, he was the Georgetown

Township board member for many years, and he's done these

BODs for a long time.

And then we have Josh Westgate. He is from the Wright Township area, he was Wright Township Supervisor for many years as well.

So I try to pick supervisors or board members from other townships, who have been through the process, understand Drain Code, understand how to run a meeting, and also understand the other side of it, coming from the township's view and how important drainage is countywide.

So, gentlemen, at this time, please rise and raise your right hand.

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to give their report.

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ENGINEER LUCAS TIMMER: Thanks.

My name is Lucas Timmer, I'm an engineer with Prein & Newhof out of Holland.

And today we're going to present to you on the Surry Oak Drain.

So as Joe mentioned in the introduction, the Surry Oak Drain is an orphan drain system, so that means that it is an existing storm water drain system that is without authorized local and county governmental jurisdiction, and administrative, procedural, and funding mechanisms to address current or future needs for maintenance and improvements.

So essentially, Ottawa County Water Resources

Commissioner at this time does not own the drain, the road

commission doesn't own the drain, the township doesn't own

the drain, because there was no legal framework for them to

be responsible for the drain. So Holland Township has been

proactive throughout the township of getting these orphan

drain systems established and making them a part of the

Ottawa County Water Resource Commissioner's drain system.

So to do that, Holland Township filed a petition to establish a drainage district on March 3, 2022. And once that petition was established, the Michigan Drain Code then requires us to have this Board of Determination, which we're all at here today.

So we were hired to do some of the preliminary engineering work for this Board of Determination.

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So one of the first things we reviewed was we reviewed the utility record plans, which are the water main plans, sanitary sewer plans, storm sewer plans that you have for your neighborhood. And we also reviewed plat maps, so we looked at the Oak Park Hills plat, which was setup in 1961; Oak Valley Estates was setup in 1969; and Oak Valley Estates No. 2 was setup in 1979.

So once we reviewed all that information, we then delineated a drainage district. So a drainage district is essentially a watershed. The land within the drainage district would then contribute runoff to the proposed Surry Oak Drain infrastructure. And we're able to do that by using one-foot county contour data, and also using aerial data, and our record plans also help us to figure out then where high points and low points are in the road which can help us delineate a watershed.

We then always go out to visit the site to visit the drain infrastructure. So we drive around the site and make sure we have some confidence in our watershed boundary, and also to confirm where the drain infrastructure is located within your neighborhood and confirm drainage patterns.

So this is the map of the drainage district and the route and course.

Back on the easel over there you can get a lot better view of that map, and you can definitely look at that following the end of the meeting here.

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But this red boundary here is our drainage district boundary or our watershed boundary. So the land within this drainage district is considered contributing to the proposed infrastructure.

And we also have a storm sewer system that runs along Surry Oak Drive. It has a backyard 12-inch that gets some water from the backyards at the house on the west end, and it travels to the east, and then it goes through an easement through the side yards here of the two properties along Hill View Drive, and then discharges into an open drain here, into Drain Number 40.

We also have some drain infrastructure on Ann Street that drains Ann Street through a side yard easement that drains back to Number 40.

The Oak Park Hills infrastructure is also leaching basins. So we have leaching basins on Oak Park drive in two locations. We also have leaching basins on two locations on Beth Street. And leaching basins essentially are catch basins that have a bunch of holes in the structure that then drain that water through infiltration into the sand in that area.

You can also see on this map the different plat

boundaries. So here is Oak Valley Estates No. 2; Oak Valley Estates, this is to the north; and then the oldest plat, Oak Park Hills is the furthest plat to the north.

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So following this we'll have a time for public testimony. At the end of public testimony the Board will then determine if it's necessary, the necessity of the petition, based on public health, welfare and/or convenience.

And if it's deemed necessary by the Board, then this existing system will no longer be an orphan system, it will be part of a Water Resources Commissioner drain system.

If deemed not necessary by the Board, then no further action will occur, and the system will remain an orphan system.

So if the drain is deemed necessary by the Board, and we find out that there is no drainage issues, which at the time we're not aware of any drainage issues, then Holland Township will cover all the costs of getting this established as a county drain. So those costs will then not be assessed out to anyone else. The township will cover those costs.

However, if we find out there are drainage issues, and you guys bring things up that need addressing, and that requires a project, we will then review what is a feasible project. We will review that with Ottawa County. They will select what makes sense as a feasible project, we will do design and survey, acquire any easements if they're needed.

We would bid the project out, and then construction would occur.

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And then following that, there would be something called a Day of Review of Apportionment. So essentially the Day of Review of Apportionment, the apportionment splits the cost out to everyone within the drainage district.

In this case, assessments would then be made to Ottawa County, the Ottawa County Road Commission, Holland Township, and the property owners within that drainage district boundary.

But if that project did occur, Holland Township would still cover the costs of getting this established, but then those project costs on top of that, Holland Township would only pay a portion of those costs, with the county and the road commission and the property owners paying the remainder of the costs of that project.

So if drainage issues ever were to occur in the future, let's say there was a storm sewer collapsed or something in your neighborhood, what would end up happening is a petition would be needed by the township or the residents of the drainage district to maintain the county drain, if the project costs more than 5,000 per mile. So that's per Drain Code.

So let's say one of those leaching basins was filled with leafs and needed to be cleaned out, the county

can do that work without the petition since it would be less 1 2 than the 5,000 per mile drain. 3 But if it was a large project, we would have 4 another petition like this, a Board of Determination where 5 you guys would all get invited so you'd be made aware of that 6 project. 7 If a project were to occur in the future, 8 assessments for all future projects would be made to the 9 county, the road commission, the township and Holland 10 Township. 11 So that's the end of my presentation. I'll go back 12 to the map here. Thank you. 13 BOARD CHAIR RICH VANDER KLOK: Okay, Lucas, thank 14 you so much. 15 Before we open public comment, I just wonder, 16 Steve, do you have anything that you want to add to this? 17 HOLLAND TOWNSHIP MANAGER STEVE BULTHUIS: No, just reiterate what Joe said at the outset that the township is 18 19 going in a very deliberate manner, working through having all 2.0 of these orphan drains within the township come under the 2.1 jurisdiction of the Water Resources Commissioner. 22 BOARD CHAIR RICH VANDER KLOK: Okay. Thank you. 23 Jerry, from Ottawa County Road Commission, anything 24 from you Jerry? 25 ROAD COMMISSION JERRY OLMAN: Yeah. I'm in

agreement with the orphan drains being transferred ownership 1 2 to the drain, have it become a county drain system. 3 But on this particular one, on Beth Street, about 4 two months ago, I don't know if these are addresses here, 5 130, or if that's a property number. But anyway right near 6 the bend of those two leaching systems, that property owner 7 called and said that leaching system wasn't functioning 8 properly -- there was some standing water. 9 So when I got out to take a look at it, the 10 standing water wasn't there anymore. So it looks to me like 11 it still functions, it just functions not as well as it did 12 back in the '60s when it was installed. 13 BOARD CHAIR RICH VANDER KLOK: Sure. 14 ROAD COMMISSION JERRY OLMAN: But that's the only 15 issue that I've come across. 16 BOARD CHAIR RICH VANDER KLOK: Okay. Thank you, 17 Jerry. 18 Then we'll open it for public comment, and if you'd 19 like to make a comment, please state your name and your 2.0 address, and let us know if you live within the district. 2.1 And in order to do this, I think I'll just start

MR. GORDON JAEHNIG: We're Gordon and Barb Jaehnig.

1	First of all, just a point of clarification. It
2	says that a petition was filed with the Ottawa County Water
3	Resources Commissioner, who filed this petition?
4	BOARD CHAIR RICH VANDER KLOK: It would probably
5	have been the township.
6	MR. GORDON JAEHNIG: And on whose behalf then was
7	it filed, I guess?
8	BOARD CHAIR RICH VANDER KLOK: I would say on
9	behalf of the township, the residents.
10	MR. GORDON JAEHNIG: Okay. The timing of this
11	thing just kind of bothers me a little bit because I know
12	Midwest Construction is looking to develop some or build
13	some units adjacent to the subdivision there. And I know
14	there have been some drainage issues.
15	So I guess I'm just trying to clarify whether we're
16	really doing this for Scott Geerlings of Midwest Construction
17	or whether we're doing it for the residents of the
18	neighborhood.
19	And, by the way, we have a storm drain in our yard
20	that works fine, you know.
21	So I guess I'm of the opinion, if it aint broke,
22	don't fix it, especially if it's going to cost the existing
23	residents a lot of money.
24	BOARD CHAIR RICH VANDER KLOK: Right. Well at this
25	particular time we don't know of any issues. So there is no

1 project that's planned. 2 And the only reason that there would be a project 3 would be if we hear from you, the residents that there is a 4 major issue out there. Then obviously the county would have 5 to take some action, if it's brought into the county system. 6 But we are not aware of any issues that are there. 7 It's just simply to bring it into the county system. 8 MR. GORDON JAEHNIG: Okay. Well obviously from my 9 perspective there are no issues, but I can't speak for 10 everybody in the subdivision. 11 BOARD CHAIR RICH VANDER KLOK: Sure. And based on 12 what we've heard from the road commission also, apparently 13 there aren't, and from the engineer, there are not issues 14 there. 15 MR. GORDON JAEHNIG: So then back to the question, 16 is this tied into the Midwest Construction proposal to build 17 apartment buildings in that area that we're talking about? 18 BOARD CHAIR RICH VANDER KLOK: I have no idea, 19 maybe -- Joe. 2.0 WATER RESOURCES COMM. JOE BUSH: Mr. Chair, would you want me to just take a few seconds? 21 22 BOARD CHAIR RICH VANDER KLOK: Yes. 23 WATER RESOURCES COMM. JOE BUSH: I can kind of 24 makes a few clarifications. 25 And you're right, I know Scott Geerlings has

reached out to me a few times. This has nothing to do, and it's court recorded, it has nothing to do with Scott Geerlings' Midwest development or whatever he's proposing with the township. I know that's probably under the planning commission and there is a lot of steps for that.

One thing that Mr. Geerlings brought to my attention for the protection of the homeowners, there is a drain that's an open ditch that comes about right where the property line is, right?

ENGINEER LUCAS TIMMER: Right.

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WATER RESOURCES COMM. JOE BUSH: And they had proposed enclosing that to the county drain at their cost.

So if they develop this (indicating), there is no impact to the drainage for the subdivisions because here is what happens in developments, at no fault of anybody's, but five years after they develop, you start having drainage problems because of the development.

Scott Geerlings said, and I'm quoting him so he's not -- not word for word, I'm not quoting him, I should say, he wanted to make sure that that does not have any impact moving forward. And he wanted to make sure that it was sized correctly, and it's part of the easement that he was willing to grant, and he doesn't want any flooding because it is taking a lot of water on.

There is maybe proposed developments down the road.

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That size 48-inch seems a little big, right, but I think it's

     Scott -- this isn't for Scott Geerlings' project at all,

     because the drain district is over here. But guess what, if
23
     there is an impact here, it's going to affect everybody's
24
     water over there.
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So that's why Midwest said, you know, why don't I

- just enclose that, so then if -- I don't even know what's 1 2 happening with Midwest. That's at the township and state level, and I don't even know. We haven't seen anything on it 3 4 as far as plans. Because it hasn't got -- I don't know, 5 Steve? 6 HOLLAND TOWNSHIP MANAGER STEVE BULTHUIS: I'm not. 7 aware -- I know he's been through the planning commission review process, but I don't know if he's pulled a permit, 8 9 building permit yet. 10 WATER RESOURCES COMM. JOE BUSH: Correct. So I 11 don't know where it is yet. But we will review that stuff 12 and I know it hasn't come before us. 13 The only thing they were going to get would be a 14 soil erosion permit, because that is our county drain that 15 he's tying into with that 48-inch. So that dashed blue line 16 is the Number 40, which is that county drain. 17 So, and again, this has nothing to do with today's project because the whole cost, and it's court recorded, the 18 19 whole cost, is picked up by Midwest to lay a 48-inch pipe to 2.0 get to this drain, because then there is no obstruction for 21 future development. 22 Whether it happens or not, I don't know . I can't 23 say, because I don't know. So that's what I know. 24 MS. BARB JAEHNIG: I'm Barb Jaehnig, Gordon's wife,
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obviously. Same address, 337 Donann Drive.

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And it seems to me if that is an orphan project right now, you guys, the township does not have control of it at all, then them taking that portion of that drain and putting, making it 48-inch so that they can build there, and build these apartments, and so on and so forth, that they're doing with Georgetown -- or I'm sorry, with our township here, Holland Township, could be an issue. And it seems to me like maybe, hey, if this is part of the township, then that's a heck of a lot easier for them.

Plus, every time you obtain something, and then you look into it, it's like, oh, yeah, it looks great now. But then you look at it and, oh, no, there is this problem, this problem, this problem, we're going to have to tax the owner for that. And then the taxes come back to us.

I also want to know, when you did your petition, did you go around to all the people that live in this area and talk to them about what they want? Or did you just --

WATER RESOURCES COMM. JOE BUSH: When it's a petition from the township, that's not required. They do pass a resolution and it's on the agenda at the township level.

MS. BARB JAEHNIG: Okay, that's fine. But this affects the people in that area, and I think it should be a resolution --

WATER RESOURCES COMM. JOE BUSH: It was.

MS. BARB JAEHNIG: -- that you talk to them and 1 2 have them sign the petition, not just the people that are 3 here in the office and here is what we want to do, so we'll 4 sign a petition so we can take ownership of it. To me that's 5 stealing. 6 WATER RESOURCES COMM. JOE BUSH: Well it's not 7 stealing because it's on the agenda, and it's way beforehand, 8 and there is a resolution. The township board does vote on it. 10 MS. BARB JAEHNIG: Well the board votes on it, but 11 does the board live there? 12 WATER RESOURCES COMM. JOE BUSH: They're the 13 township representation. 14 So in drain law, I'm just saying, you know, don't 15 bite off the hand, I'm just giving you the message. It's 16 drain law. MS. BARB JAEHNIG: I'm just saying, if you look at 17 18 it as a whole picture, it looks really fishy. 19 ENGINEER KEN BOSMA: Well I might just add a few 2.0 things. 21 With regard to why the township petitions it, they 22 can do that by Drain Code. But why they do that is because 23 it's sitting under a public right-of-way. If there is a 24 failure there, that affects the street, and the road

commission, and the township don't have any rights to repair

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this drain. So this is why they've been going through the 1 2 process with many of these throughout the township to clean 3 these up. 4 It's no different than any other infrastructure, 5 like water main, sanitary sewer, somebody has the ability to 6 get in there and fix and repair this, this is why they're 7 doing the process. 8 And in answer to the parcel to the east there, 9 there is a -- there is actually a benefit of us, right now, 10 doing this drain. And even if they feel like they attached 11 to it, they're granting an easement here that gives us right, 12 because right now it's not a county drain, that gives us 13 right to get to that county Drain 40, and they are going to 14 do this at no cost to us. 15 If there was a significant cost here, those would 16 have to be passed onto the property owners as well. So there is a big benefit of work --17 18 MS. BARB JAEHNIG: I understand what you're saying, 19 but --2.0 WATER RESOURCES COMM. JOE BUSH: Let me give you 2.1 this. 22 MS. BARB JAEHNIG: In the end, it's to their 23 benefit. 2.4 ENGINEER KEN BOSMA: No. 25 MS. BARB JAEHNIG: It is.

ENGINEER KEN BOSMA: It's to your benefit too.

MS. BARB JAEHNIG: No, it is, because they want to build on that property. They want to make sure everything is right for them so that they can get a bunch of people in there, and they can earn, you know, what, a thousand, \$1500 on each unit that they build there.

WATER RESOURCES COMM. JOE BUSH: Have you been to the township board? Has there been hearings at the planning commission?

MS. BARB JAEHNIG: Yes, and we were there, it was via Zoom, because it was during COVID. But yeah, we were there.

WATER RESOURCES COMM. JOE BUSH: Let me give you a hypothetical because this happens in my world. I have the whole county, not just Holland Township. What if Geerlings didn't really like to keep that open ditch maintained, we don't hold a public hearing, and it happens to get filled in and causes flooding? There is no easement, there is no county drain, who are you going to call to go on Scott Geerlings' property and fix it? How are you going to fix it? How would you fix it?

As a property owner, say you lived right here (indicating), and that drain goes right to the property line, right? It's a 48-inch pipe already there. All we're doing is attaching it.

JOE BUSH: Oh, 11:00, we have 7 another one, Quality Car Wash is going in where the old Burger King was and River. Should we go after Quality Car 8 9 Wash because they're putting a car wash there? 10 I mean it's another orphan drain system that has no 11 jurisdiction, and it's not for Quality Car Wash. 12 because it's on the list to actually -- we have another six 13 -- 50 of these orphans in the township? We're just trying to 14 get ten a year. 15 This just happened to be on the list and it 16 happened to be Scott Geerlings is next door. 17 Now when I talked to Scott, I said, hey, what about 18 that drain that goes to Drain 40, what are you going to do with that? 19 2.0 He's like, what do you want to do? 2.1 And I said, at your cost you're going to have to 22 enclose it to make sure that those people to the west do not 23 have flood and have water problems. 24 So you don't have to go dig it out, clean it out, 25 there is no cost to you, to anybody, period, the township, no

1 taxpayer's money. 2 Scott said, I will do that before -- even if the project doesn't even happen, you're getting an enclosure to 3 4 Drain 40. Even if the township or whatever turns the 5 development down, you're still getting an enclosure, no 6 matter what. 7 MS. BARB JAEHNIG: And it looks more like what's 8 happening is, oh, well we really need that enclosed in order 9 to develop this property. So --10 WATER RESOURCES COMM. JOE BUSH: No, they don't 11 need it enclosed. 12 MS. BARB JAEHNIG: So if this is part of the 13 township, we can go ahead and enclose it and get permission 14 to do it, and then we can go ahead and build and everything 15 is good to go. 16 WATER RESOURCES COMM. JOE BUSH: It has nothing to 17 do with why we're here today. 18 BOARD CHAIR RICH VANDER KLOK: We're going to move 19 on. 2.0 As far as you folks are concerned, there is no 21 issue in the district that you don't want, correct? Your 22 concern is --23 MS. BARB JAEHNIG: But the --2.4 BOARD CHAIR RICH VANDER KLOK: Wait a minute, your 25 concern is potential development to the east?

MS. BARB JAEHNIG: And -- and, it's also that there 1 2 is no issues now, but then all of the sudden it becomes part 3 of the township, and then, oh, yeah, we found this and this 4 and this, and there go your taxes. 5 BOARD CHAIR RICH VANDER KLOK: Well, but there are 6 no issues now. 7 MR. GORDON JAEHNIG: Correct. 8 ENGINEER KEN BOSMA: May I just jump in one more 9 time? 10 One of the things that was outlined in our slides 11 there is if there is no project now, and this is developed as 12 a county drain, that's it. 13 If there is a problem in the future that's 14 expensive, it has to go through this same process that we're 15 doing right now. 16 So there is another opportunity again for people to 17 speak and to address if it's an expensive process. As we 18 indicated, if it's just cleaning out a leaching basin or 19 something like that, that can be done under the code because 2.0 the drain commissioner can spend up to 5,000 per mile per 2.1 drain, which isn't a lot of money. Anything beyond that we 22 have to go back through this procedure again. 23 MS. BARB JAEHNIG: I understand that. But it just 24 seems to me like we come here, we talk to you guys about

issues that we've got with some of the things you're doing,

Even though 10 the pipe goes out, there will be no water coming into that 11 part of that pipe. 12 BOARD MEMBER HOWARD BAUMANN: But you'll have an 13 easement for that portion. 14 WATER RESOURCES COMM. JOE BUSH: Yes. Because he's 15 already looking at that, because if it does get developed, at 16 some point we'll be doing a drainage review on that parcel, 17 which he's not submitted anything. And then we'll have our own detention ponds and all the other stuff per our 18 19 development standards. But that hasn't came in. 2.0 So that's why I can't hypothetically speak if it's 2.1 happening or not because I haven't seen it. I don't know 22 where it is with the township. I know they were working with 23 the planning township. 24 BOARD CHAIR RICH VANDER KLOK: Go ahead. 25 BOARD MEMBER HOWARD BAUMANN: I think --

3	idea to take this into the county system just so there is a

Just a few other quick comments that why we're here and talking about developments, my office is not, you know -- we go and follow the law. And we also can't turn away developments because, whether property owners don't like it or, you know, a lot -- it goes to the planning commissions, it goes through the zoning. There is a lot of requirements met for developments.

When it gets to my office, we look at the drainage, we look at the water quality features and our development standards.

I just wanted that in the minutes to say that, I get people calling me, you got to stop this development.

Well it's got to go through the townships. Every township, all three of you know, you all got different zoning, ordinances. So when it comes to my office, it's usually making sure they're doing their development standards as far as water quality and all the flood management, and storage, and detention, retention ponds and all the other fun stuff that we have to review.

So I just wanted to make that note too.

1	BOARD CHAIR RICH VANDER KLOK: Okay, thank you.
2	MS. BARB JAEHNIG: Then can I make a note too or is
3	it only him that gets to make additional
4	BOARD CHAIR RICH VANDER KLOK: Well the public
5	comment time is over.
