3	PROCEEDINGS
4	WATER RESOURCES COMM. JOE BUSH: Well good morning,
5	everyone. I'm Joe Bush, your Ottawa Water Resources
6	Commissioner or Drain Commissioner.
7	It's 10 o'clock and we're here for the Board of
8	Determination for the Country Meadows Estates Drain.
9	You're probably like why am I here this morning,
10	why at 10, and what is this about?
11	Well in Holland Township and most of the 17
12	townships in Ottawa County there is storm sewer that is not
13	owned by anybody. The Road Commission, the Township, or
14	myself, the County, and we're trying to figure out, well what
15	do we do when something needs fixed or repaired? Who do you
16	call? You always wonder, who do you call?
17	And as long as it's working, right, nobody really
18	sees it or cares about it because it's underground and
19	functioning. When it's broken, you don't know who to call
20	and you don't know who is going to pay for it and you just
21	wonder who owns it or who has jurisdiction over it.
22	That would usually be the Water Resources
23	Commissioner or Drain Commissioner. But we're here today to
24	establish an orphan drain that nobody owns. The Township is

going through a process to establish all these orphan drains.

And they're paying the upfront costs to have an engineer look at it, and he'll give a presentation later.

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And it's just a matter of the process in the Drain Code. The Drain Code, it starts off with a petition, that would be by the township or the people, but the Township wants to do this with multiple drains. I think we've been doing these for the last five years.

And Park Township is doing it, there are other townships that are following suit. Grand Haven Township is next, Georgetown has probably 300 of these. They're orphan drains that were put in in the '80s, '70s, even the '60s that nobody really has jurisdiction. There is easements, but nobody really has the ability to go in and do the work and there is always a cost.

And then it's always, well how much do we pay, and there is a lot of questions with that.

So to start the process, Drain Code requires a petition. The Township has petitioned me for this one, Country Meadows Estate.

And if you look on the map, it's the red area. That's kind of like a watershed, that's what we call it. Drain district/watershed, it's your water contributing to this drain.

And then so once I get a petition, I setup a BOD, and that's why you ladies and gentlemen are here this morning

is for the BOD.

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And then I have to pick a three-panel board. And this three-panel board has no affiliation with any of this area or Holland Township. They own no properties in it, but they are appointed by me. And I appoint people who have experience in, number one, Drain Code; and number two, how the Drain Code works with the petition, BOD, and that's why they're here.

They're here today to listen to testimony on if you have a problem, a lot of times we don't know there is a problem unless you folks come to the public hearing; and they're here to make a decision as to establish it as a County drain, not a project. We don't have a project. There has been no complaints in this area. It's just a matter of process, the legal process.

So I'll do introductions. And then once I do introductions and swear them in, as the board, then I'll sit down and then these three gentlemen will run the meeting.

We have a court recorder. And then so when you stand up, and come up front, maybe speak into the mic with your address and your name, and just make a statement whether you're in favor or you think it's crazy or whatever. It's your time.

This isn't about Joe Bush and my department. It's about us helping you for the future. Because with

infrastructure, you know, at some point something is going to 1 2 fail because it gets old. And a lot of it has been in the 3 ground for many years already. 4 So I'll go ahead and do introductions, and then we 5 can start the public hearing. And then we'll go from there. 6 Once I -- and you can always ask questions. 7 hesitate. During public comment, go up, ask the Board any question, and then they'll reference me or the engineer. 8 9 But again, I'm Joe Bush, your Water Resources 10 Commissioner. 11 We have -- I'll go from right to left, this is the three-panel that I picked this morning for this particular 12 orphan drain. On my right is Ken Souter, he is retired from 13 14 the Road Commission as an engineer for many, many years. 15 think he had over 35 years in at the Road Commission, but 16 he's retired. 17 And then you got Bill Cargo, he is from Grand Haven 18 Township, he's their manager. 19 And then Larry Bruursema is also from the Road 2.0 Commission and Georgetown Township, retired from the Road 21 Commission quite a few years ago already, several. 22 BOARD MEMBER LARRY BRUURSEMA: WATER RESOURCES COMM. JOE BUSH: And he was a board 23 24 member at Georgetown Township for many, many years so he

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understands the process.

So when I appoint, I appointed people that listen to your concerns or problems, and they also are just here to say, it's necessary, not really pick a project. That's not why they're appointed.

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And then we have Margie. Margie is a court recorder. Everything is recorded word for word. You can always get those transcripts from my department at some point in the future if you need to go back and reference something.

So it's word for word. That's not by law. We have it just to say we got it word for word. So nothing gets confused.

Then we have Ken Bosma. He's from Prein & Newhof, he's the engineer that we picked for this. And basically his job was to determine the drainage district and also any issues out there, look at the reference, talk about when it was established -- not established, I'm sorry, constructed as a storm sewer and as a development. So he has the history on that.

We have Steve Bulthuis, he's from the Township -Don Komejan was for many years the Township manager. Steve
Bulthuis has taken over his position when he retired.

We have Jerry Olman, he's from the Road Commission.

We do a lot of these partnerships in collaboration. A lot of it is in the roads, some of it isn't in the roads, taking private water. So we work together on a lot of projects and

orphan drains is one of those.

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And then we have Chad. Chad is my newly hired chief deputy and he's picking up pretty quickly.

And then Stacy Hissong is here as a guest and she's our legal counsel that we use for the Michigan Association of County Drain Commissioners. And she does work for me as well in the County. She's just here to observe. I've been doing this for seven years, and she said hey, I don't mind sitting in today. And I said, that's fine, go ahead.

I don't think I missed anybody.

I'm going to go ahead and give these gentlemen the oath. And once I do that, they'll run the meeting from here on out.

So thank you and welcome to Holland Township.

Gentlemen, do each of you solemnly swear to faithfully perform and discharge the duties imposed upon you as members of the Board of Determination appointed by the Water Resources Commissioner of Ottawa County to determine the necessity of drainage improvements in a certain drain to be known and designated as the Country Meadows Estates Drain in the Township of Holland in said County as required by law, gentlemen?

BOARD MEMBER BILL CARGO: I shall.

BOARD MEMBER KEN SOUTER: I do.

BOARD MEMBER LARRY BRUURSEMA: I do.

1	BOARD MEMBER BILL CARGO: We'll start with the
2	election of a secretary and chair. Is there a motion to
3	elect a chairperson?
4	BOARD MEMBER KEN SOUTER: I'll move that Bill Cargo
5	be chair today.
6	BOARD MEMBER LARRY BRUURSEMA: I'll support that
7	motion.
8	BOARD MEMBER BILL CARGO: We have a motion on the
9	floor.
10	If there is no further discussion, all in favor of
11	electing Cargo to be the Chair, say aye.
12	BOARD MEMBER LARRY BRUURSEMA: Aye.
13	BOARD MEMBER BILL CARGO: Aye.
14	BOARD MEMBER KEN SOUTER: Aye.
15	BOARD MEMBER BILL CARGO: Opposition? There isn't
16	any on that.
17	BOARD MEMBER LARRY BRUURSEMA: I'll make a motion
18	that we nominate Ken Souter as the secretary.
19	BOARD CHAIRPERSON BILL CARGO: And I'll support
20	that.
21	And again we have a motion on the floor to elect
22	Ken Souter as a secretary for this meeting. There is no
23	further discussion.
24	All in favor, say aye.
25	BOARD MEMBER LARRY BRUURSEMA: Aye.

1	BOARD CHAIRPERSON BILL CARGO: Aye.
2	BOARD MEMBER KEN SOUTER: Aye.
3	BOARD CHAIRPERSON BILL CARGO: Opposed?
4	And Ken, you are now the secretary.
5	Now typically when we have public comments we try
6	to have some limit on that. We're talking here about the
7	necessity of this drain. You can summarize most novels in
8	less than three minutes, so we ask that people keep their
9	comments to three minutes.
10	So do I have a motion to limit public comments to
11	three minutes per person?
12	BOARD MEMBER LARRY BRUURSEMA: So moved.
13	BOARD SECRETARY KEN SOUTER: So moved.
14	BOARD CHAIRPERSON BILL CARGO: I'll take that as
15	Ken making the motion and Larry supporting that.
16	Any further discussion?
17	All in favor, say aye.
18	BOARD MEMBER LARRY BRUURSEMA: Aye.
19	BOARD CHAIRPERSON BILL CARGO: Aye.
20	BOARD SECRETARY KEN SOUTER: Aye.
21	BOARD CHAIRPERSON BILL CARGO: That is also then
22	approved.
23	And again what we're here for today is to see if we
24	wanted to include a certain drain within the Ottawa County
25	jurisdiction of drains. Right now we cannot spend public

1	monies on private property. And this right now is not under
2	anybody's responsibility, and so we're trying to get this
3	under the responsibility or the Township is trying to
4	bring this under the responsibility of the Ottawa County
5	Water Resources Commissioner.
6	So first I'm going to ask Steve, the new
7	superintendent, not new, he's been here a year I guess, from
8	Holland Charter Township.
9	Steve, if you have any comments, please come up to
10	the podium.
11	HOLLAND CHARTER TOWNSHIP SUPERINTENDENT STEVE
12	BULTHUIS: Well as it was mentioned a little bit earlier, the
13	Township has embarked on a process of getting orphan drains
14	established as county drains. And today's hearing, and those
15	occurring throughout last week and next week as well, is our
16	continuing effort to get these orphan drains established.
17	BOARD SECRETARY KEN SOUTER: Have you received any
18	problems on this particular drain?
19	HOLLAND CHARTER TOWNSHIP SUPERINTENDENT STEVE
20	BULTHUIS: We have not.
21	BOARD SECRETARY KEN SOUTER: Okay.
22	BOARD CHAIRPERSON BILL CARGO: Typically, if there
23	is a small problem, each community is different. What is the
24	policy for Holland Charter Township on doing maintenance work

on these type of drains? Do you say like if it's less than

1	10,000, you do it; if it's more than 10,000, then you look at
2	assessing the costs?
3	HOLLAND CHARTER TOWNSHIP SUPERINTENDENT STEVE
4	BULTHUIS: Correct.
5	BOARD CHAIRPERSON BILL CARGO: Okay.
6	HOLLAND CHARTER TOWNSHIP SUPERINTENDENT STEVE
7	BULTHUIS: That is the policy we have.
8	BOARD CHAIRPERSON BILL CARGO: I got lucky in my
9	numbers.
10	BOARD SECRETARY KEN SOUTER: You've been through
11	this before, right?
12	BOARD CHAIRPERSON BILL CARGO: I've read through
13	this before.
14	Steve, thank you.
15	The Ottawa County Road Commission is also here.
16	Any comments from the Ottawa County Road Commission?
17	OTTAWA COUNTY ROAD COMMISSION JERRY OLMAN: Other
18	than I'm not aware of any issues with the drainage in this
19	particular plat.
20	BOARD CHAIRPERSON BILL CARGO: And just for the
21	benefit of the public, will you acknowledge just your title?
22	OTTAWA COUNTY ROAD COMMISSION JERRY OLMAN: Jerry
23	Olman, environmental coordinator with the Ottawa County Road
24	Commission.
25	BOARD CHAIRPERSON BILL CARGO: I appreciate that.

Next we have Ken from Prein & Newhof, the engineering firm that has been hired by Holland Charter Township on this.

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Ken, can you give us a brief overview of the drain and why this is separate from the other drains?

ENGINEER KEN BOSMA: Yep, I appreciate it. This will be very simple because I think many things have already been addressed by Joe and by the Township and by the Road Commission.

But here is, again, just identifying what we're going through is changing from an orphan drain, which has no jurisdiction over maintaining a storm sewer system or drainage swales in a particular area, in this case Country Meadows Estate. So we're looking to potentially establish this as a County drain so somebody has, in the future, maintenance rights to get in there.

In this case it would be Joe's office that would be contacted should this become a County drain, and then Joe would work through making maintenance issues and going through the procedures as he is required by Drain Code.

For this particular project, this was petitioned by the Township on February 21 of 2019, so earlier this year, which again follows the requirements of the Drain Code for petitioning, as we are also holding this Board of Determination meeting today to go through this process.

The one item in here is just identified, it's kind of the areas that are included in this district, and there is one plat that is called the Country Meadows Estate Plat.

This plat was established in 1987.

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I think Joe alluded to it a little bit, but the establishment of these plats and their drainage systems, prior to somewhere in about the mid '90s, did not go through this process. So that's why we're going through this today.

New plats will typically have a 433 agreement that they call where they have actually the developer prepare the agreement with the drain office to say that he will takeover drainage systems now on new developments and plats.

So newer developments will not typically go through this process. This process is for those that were established somewhere before the mid '90s, at least in Ottawa County. So that's why we're going through this today.

This is the same map basically as what you see over here, the exhibit on the easel, which gives the district boundary as far as the way we see the watershed.

Generally you'll see it goes through the middle of the houses because kind of the middle of the houses, it drains towards the roads where the drainage system is at. The back yards typically do not get back in there.

This is the same one with just an aerial again, that is the same exhibit that you see over here up front.

And then again we're here just to hear if there is anything. As identified I think by the Road Commission and the Township, at this point we are unaware of any issues that are out there. You have the opportunity today to say if there are any issues that you're aware of that we need to look into. But we are not aware of any particular issues at this point.

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And I think just as referenced even by the Township just so you do recall, the Township did establish this, what they call Storm Water Drains Funding Policy, it was established in April of 2015. Probably some of this was a result of a lot of the flooding that occurred in 2008, 2009 and '13, but they are doing this so that we have a more expedient process should issues arise.

But again, they are paying for the cost of this process so there is no costs to the residents.

But if we get into a project that becomes a more expensive project, should the storm sewer collapse or whatever it may be, at that point there could be a time where parcels could wind up paying for something. But again, today, we're not aware of any issues that are out there.

BOARD CHAIRPERSON BILL CARGO: Ken, just a quick question. From what I understand you said that now newer developments all have these agreements in place before they sell a single home or a single lot.

But at the time this was created, it was assumed 1 2 that this was going to be part of the Ottawa County Road Commission because of the public easements and so forth, is 3 4 that correct? 5 ENGINEER KEN BOSMA: It was. But I think going 6 through all the process with the Road Commission --7 BOARD CHAIRPERSON BILL CARGO: But they have legal opinion saying that's not sufficient which is why they're 8 9 going through this. So it was always assumed it would be 10 part of the Ottawa County Drain Commission or Water Resources 11 Commission, they just didn't have the proper paperwork in 12 place to actually legally establish it. 13 ENGINEER KEN BOSMA: Correct. And I think you 14 might have alluded to that before. So prior to this being 15 established, I think when there were issues, there were 16 sometimes agreements between townships and road commissions 17 and that to help facilitate those repairs. Again, however, I think in light of all the 18 19 flooding issues in '08 through '13, it took a hit on a lot of 2.0 financial waves. And I think as it's come more to light to 21 say, hey, this really needs to be looked at as a whole. 22 BOARD CHAIRPERSON BILL CARGO: Appreciate it. 23 BOARD SECRETARY KEN SOUTER: One other question. 24 This looks like it drains into a water course. Is that

watercourse an established --

1	ENGINEER KEN BOSMA: That's Noordeloos Creek.
2	BOARD SECRETARY KEN SOUTER: Is that established?
3	ENGINEER KEN BOSMA: It is not.
4	BOARD SECRETARY KEN SOUTER: That is not a County
5	drain?
6	ENGINEER KEN BOSMA: It is not.
7	BOARD CHAIRPERSON BILL CARGO: Larry, any
8	questions.
9	BOARD MEMBER LARRY BRUURSEMA: No.
10	BOARD CHAIRPERSON BILL CARGO: What we're going to
11	do now is we'll open it up for public comments.
12	When you come up to the mic, if you would simply
13	state your name and address for the record, we would
14	appreciate that. Identify where your lands are within this
15	proposed storm drain district. And again keep your comments
16	to three minutes or less.
17	First of all I want to just check, do we have any
18	written correspondence regarding this public hearing?
19	WATER RESOURCES COMM. JOE BUSH: No.
20	BOARD CHAIRPERSON BILL CARGO: Okay, no written
21	correspondence.
22	So what I'm going to do is start in the very back
23	row, back on the left, if you have any questions or comments,

2	to explain what they are. If there are problems that are
3	identified, we will turn them over to the director, and he
4	will have his staff investigate and see if there are
5	solutions that can be used.
6	MR. CURT MONTNEY: Okay. All right. Good.
7	BOARD CHAIRPERSON BILL CARGO: But what you're
8	identifying is the fact that you are having water level
9	issues that are causing problems with sump pumps in flooded
10	or wet basements?
11	MR. CURT MONTNEY: Okay.
12	BOARD SECRETARY KEN SOUTER: How about surface
13	water?
14	MR. CURT MONTNEY: Surface water in the yard you
15	mean?
16	BOARD SECRETARY KEN SOUTER: Yes.
17	MR. CURT MONTNEY: Not really, no.
18	BOARD SECRETARY KEN SOUTER: Okay. It's basically
19	the water table problems that you're having the problem with?
20	MR. CURT MONTNEY: Yes.
21	BOARD SECRETARY KEN SOUTER: Okay.
22	MR. CURT MONTNEY: And a sump pump where I've
23	replaced probably five pumps over the course of 20 years.
24	BOARD SECRETARY KEN SOUTER: Okay.
25	BOARD CHAIRPERSON BILL CARGO: Where do you pump it

1	by the way? Do you just pump it back in the backyard?
2	MR. CURT MONTNEY: Yes.
3	BOARD CHAIRPERSON BILL CARGO: So it's kind of
4	recirculating then.
5	MR. CURT MONTNEY: Yeah.
6	BOARD CHAIRPERSON BILL CARGO: I appreciate that.
7	BOARD SECRETARY KEN SOUTER: Are all of your
8	neighbors having the same kind of problems?
9	MR. CURT MONTNEY: You know, I think a lot of
10	people don't like to talk about water in the basements for
11	resale reasons, and I think a lot of people hide that.
12	But I see a lot of water restoration trucks in the
13	neighborhood.
14	BOARD CHAIRPERSON BILL CARGO: Okay.
15	MR. CURT MONTNEY: And so I think there is probably
16	more problems.
17	BOARD SECRETARY KEN SOUTER: So you got a
18	groundwater problem.
19	MR. CURT MONTNEY: Yeah, exactly.
20	BOARD CHAIRPERSON BILL CARGO: Thank you.
21	And next?
22	MS. JULIE VALE: My name is Julie Vale and I also
23	live at 2565 Meadow Drive.
24	BOARD CHAIRPERSON BILL CARGO: Okay.
25	MS. JULIE VALE: So my question is is this whole

process, aside from what Curt just brought up, just renaming 1 2 and reassigning this? Or are there going to be initial 3 improvements made? BOARD CHAIRPERSON BILL CARGO: 4 There are no initial 5 improvements that are being discussed at this time. This is 6 simply establishing the drain so for maintenance purposes or 7 if problems develop, public monies can be spent to resolve or solve those issues. 8 9 So if you have specific issues that you would like 10 to have the Water Resources Commissioner look at, let us 11 know, and now is the time to explain. 12 MS. JULIE VALE: Well as he just mentioned, I'm at 13 the same house. 14 BOARD CHAIRPERSON BILL CARGO: 15 MS. JULIE VALE: So will that be addressed? 16 BOARD CHAIRPERSON BILL CARGO: We will turn it over 17 to the Water Resources Commissioner. We're not going to 18 address that here. We're only addressing whether there is a 19 public need or a necessity to establish that drainage 2.0 district. 2.1 MS. JULIE VALE: Okay. Thank you. 22 BOARD CHAIRPERSON BILL CARGO: Thank you. 23 In the back row? 2.4 MS. KAYE DeMANN: Hi, I'm Kaye DeMann. I live at 25 2625 Meadow which is also about halfway up -- I back up to

1 | the field there.

We actually have not really had water in our basement, however our sump pump does run a lot. But we're in clay. So when we bought, we realized that that would happen.

So that's not a real big concern.

BOARD CHAIRPERSON BILL CARGO: Okay.

MS. KAYE DeMANN: My question is is what I heard from the Township is now if there was a problem with the drain as an orphan, that they would cover up to 10,000. And I see once we switch this over if there is a problem, the County is only going to cover up to 5,000, correct?

BOARD SECRETARY KEN SOUTER: That's on a particular instance, right?

MS. KAYE DeMANN: Right.

BOARD CHAIRPERSON BILL CARGO: It really depends because the County can spend up to 5,000 per mile without going through a hearing process. And so it's not that they're just going to spend 5,000. That's what their limit is.

And so what they're saying right now is without establishing this drain, they can not spend public monies on what is essentially still a private drain system. And that would then become the responsibility of the property owners. And however you did that, would be up to you.

But this is a way that public monies, whether it be

from the Road Commission, whether it be from the Township or 1 2 whether it be from the County could be spent to resolve an 3 issue. 4 If we hear the issues, bigger issues may require 5 them to go through a hearing process and have a special 6 assessment. 7 MS. KAYE DeMAAN: Right. 8 BOARD CHAIRMAN BILL CARGO: Is that a fair summary? 9 WATER RESOURCES COMM. JOE BUSH: Well I think her 10 question is is the Township not going to pay the \$10,000 11 policy. And they're still going to pay it, even being a 12 County drain, their policy still is \$10,000 up front. 13 BOARD CHAIRPERSON BILL CARGO: Yes. WATER RESOURCES COMM. JOE BUSH: So they're still 14 15 going to pay that regardless. 16 MS. KAYE DeMANN: That was my question. 17 wondering if we were going to be losing 5,000 --18 WATER RESOURCES COMM. JOE BUSH: No, you're not 19 going to lose the 5,000. 2.0 MS. KAYE DeMANN: Otherwise, I don't have any other 2.1 questions. 22 BOARD CHAIRPERSON BILL CARGO: Thank. And we have 23 one other person. 24 So again just your name and address. 25 MS. LISA SHIPP: Lisa Shipp, 2447 Meadow Drive.

1	So I

5	BOARD CHAIRPERSON BILL CARGO: Okay.
6	MS. LISA SHIPP: So at the very beginning of the
7	subdivision.
8	So you've addressed that this is just basically to
9	put ownership within the County so that any type of
10	improvements necessary could be done at that point. And then
11	any subsequent assessments would be probably, again,
12	determined by the significant amount of damage or whatever
13	had to be repaired.
14	It does concern me that the comment was made this
15	feeds, the drain feeds into the Noordeloos Creek there and
16	that's not considered a drain. So my guess would be that
17	something if this were approved and went forward, that
18	something would have to be either reengineered or determined
19	how that drain that just sounds like dollar signs to me.
20	There is not really a question there. I'm just trying to
21	understand how that process would work.
22	WATER RESOURCES COMM. JOE BUSH: If you don't mind,
23	Mr. Chair?
24	BOARD CHAIRPERSON BILL CARGO: Go ahead.
25	WATER RESOURCES COMM. JOE BUSH: What we typically

do on the Noordeloos -- we're not going to reinvent the subdivision. It is what it is.

MS. LISA SHIPP: Sure.

2.0

WATER RESOURCES COMM. JOE BUSH: And the creek is an orphan. We do temporarily go in there, very cautiously and remove some trees if it's really going to flood people out.

We have the ability to do that, but it's very limited and the cost is very limited. But if people are going to flood, and if your -- if your subdivision is going to flood because the Noordeloos has a problem -- but we're not going to establish the Noordeloos, they're not going to petition any time soon for the Noordeloos. We're just trying to get the orphan subdivisions primarily because of the underground infrastructure that could be failing in the next five, ten, fifteen years.

So to answer your question, we're not going to come in and do anything as far as changing the storm sewer in the subdivision currently. There is nothing to change. It was designed accordingly in '87. Hopefully that answers your question.

MS. LISA SHIPP: I think so. Just as a matter of information to my neighbors, we have had -- I've been there since 2000, so almost 20 years. We've had one significant issue where we had water like this far from the top of the

sump well (indicating). And that was probably 2008, 2009 when we had a lot of that flooding. We managed to not have any water damage or whatever.

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But what we've been told by neighbors across the street from us, is that that east side is typically -- their sump pumps run when there is even just a rain all the time. So I don't know if we're just sitting up higher or have better drainage. We have a lot of sand, so maybe the contractor did a little better job, I don't know.

But we've had one near miss, I guess I'll call it.

My neighbors across the street also reported, and they would be right across the street, that they have had either the Township out or the County at one point. And he's got a drain right in front of his driveway, and it -- he was told that his driveway is kind of going into disrepair because sand and earth and stuff is moving out from underneath there.

WATER RESOURCES COMM. JOE BUSH: That's where we come into play.

 $\,$ MS. LISA SHIPP: Exactly. So if nothing was done and this was voted down, then we as the subdivision owners would be --

BOARD CHAIRPERSON BILL CARGO: Or the individual property owners, yes.

MS. LISA SHIPP: It would be up to us to determine

what to do. 1 2 BOARD CHAIRPERSON BILL CARGO: That's -- legally I 3 don't think they can spend public monies on what essentially 4 would be a private issue. 5 MS. LISA SHIPP: Right. 6 WATER RESOURCES COMM. JOE BUSH: That's correct. 7 MS. LISA SHIPP: I just wanted to clarify that. I think that's all the comments I have. 8 9 BOARD SECRETARY KEN SOUTER: Thank you. 10 BOARD CHAIRPERSON BILL CARGO: Any there any other 11 members of the public who would like to make any other 12 comments? 13 MS. JULIE VALE: Sorry, I have another one when she 14 brought that up. 15 Julie Vale, 2565 Meadow Drive, right in the middle. 16 We have also a drain right at the edge of our 17 driveway in front of -- in our front yard. And same thing, 18 our driveway is also jacked up and cracked and everything 19 else. So is that displacing, the fact that the drain is 2.0 right there in front of our house? 21 BOARD CHAIRPERSON BILL CARGO: It's kind of hard to 22 establish that, especially at this point, but you could 23 simply ask the drain commissioner to come out there, because 24 if the drain pipes have separated and it's sucking in some of

the soil from the outside, it may be causing some sink holes

1	to form which could impact that.
2	But we can't tell you that without them going out
3	there and looking at it.
4	MS. JULIE VALE: Okay.
5	BOARD CHAIRPERSON BILL CARGO: Thank you.
6	That said, we're going to close the public comment
7	portion of this hearing.
8	And with that I'll ask I'll start with you,
9	Larry, do you have any comments regarding this proposal to
10	bring this into the County drain system?
11	BOARD MEMBER LARRY BRUURSEMA: I see this as a
12	drainage district where the County and the Township and the
13	property owners can all get together and determine whether
14	construction or something has to be done with the water. And
15	so they'll petition the County to have a drain repaired.
16	Correct?
17	WATER RESOURCES COMM. JOE BUSH: Over \$10,000.
18	Because the Township will pay the 10,000.
19	BOARD MEMBER LARRY BRUURSEMA: Yes.
20	Otherwise that's all I have to say.
21	BOARD CHAIRPERSON BILL CARGO: Ken?
22	BOARD SECRETARY KEN SOUTER: Well we've done quite
23	a few of these throughout Park Township, Holland Township.
24	And it's going to happen in a lot of other townships too.
25	It just makes sense to put this drain under the

jurisdiction of an agency so if there is a problem, we know 1 2 exactly who to go to. And he can start the process to get it 3 fixed. 4 Otherwise there is always a he-she, who is supposed 5 to do it. And I like it nice and neat. 6 And we were involved in a lot of these plats a long 7 time ago, thought that they were coming under the jurisdiction of -- the drainage would be under the 8 9 jurisdiction of the drain commissioner, and it didn't happen 10 just because of legal language. 11 So I am all for these things coming under the 12 jurisdiction so we know who to tab. 13 So that's my opinion on this. 14 BOARD CHAIRPERSON BILL CARGO: And I tend to agree. 15 I think it's important to bring what were always assumed to 16 be public drains legally under the responsibility of the 17 Ottawa County Water Resources Commissioner. 18 Joe, I'm going to ask a question. Typically when 19 these are held, I have a couple of motions that are laying in 2.0 front of me, one for the establishment and the other one for 2.1 the public portion of it. 22 BOARD SECRETARY KEN SOUTER: Right there. 23 BOARD CHAIRPERSON BILL CARGO: And there I have it, 24 okay. 25 ATTORNEY STACY HISSONG: There is only one.

BOARD CHAIRPERSON BILL CARGO: Okay. We've brought 1 2 it down to one motion from two. So we're making it even 3 simpler. 4 Then I will make a motion that the location and 5 establishment and construction of the County Meadows Estates 6 Drain is necessary and conducive to the public health, 7 convenience and welfare. 8 BOARD SECRETARY KEN SOUTER: I'll support that 9 motion. 10 BOARD CHAIRPERSON BILL CARGO: So now that we have 11 a motion on the floor. Last chance to make any public 12 comments from the board members, anything else that you would 13 like to say? 14 Then all in favor, say aye. 15 BOARD MEMBER LARRY BRUURSEMA: Aye. 16 BOARD CHAIRPERSON BILL CARGO: Aye. 17 BOARD SECRETARY KEN SOUTER: Aye. 18 BOARD CHAIRPERSON BILL CARGO: All opposed? 19 And it was passed unanimously. 2.0 That said, we do -- I'm going to then turn this 2.1 over for some closing comments from the Ottawa County Water 22 Resources Commissioner. He's going to mention briefly the 23 appeals process, and then make any closing statements before 24 we adjourn. 25 Joe?

WATER RESOURCES COMM. JOE BUSH: Thank you, Mr. 1 2 Chair. 3 Again I appreciate your time this morning. You're 4 probably wondering why I don't hold these at night, and 5 usually I don't get anymore people at night than I do at the daytime. So it's kind of a Catch 22. I just happen to have 6 7 these orphans in the morning. So I appreciate your time coming here, and you 8 9 probably have better things to do but you came here to 10 listen, and I appreciate that. And you can share with your 11 neighbors as well. 12 On the appeal process, that happens if we happen to 13 have another petition and there is a large assessment, or a 14 large project, there is always the opportunity to appeal an 15 assessment down the road. 16 Today there is no cost to the public. The Township is actually picking these up at large. So any orphan drain 17 that we do in Holland Township, they're paid. 18 19 Again I want to make sure it's clear that the 2.0 Township will pay that 10,000 whether it's established or 21 They will take care of up to \$10,000 up front. 22 But if it exceeds that, then we need the petition, 23 there is a process, we'll be back here doing the same thing, 24 then they would determine that to be necessary or not.

And then there is an appeal process on the

1	assessment, but that's down the road. I just want to make
2	you aware on the record that there is an appeal process, that
3	when people have a voice, that's the time for people to
4	appeal it or if they don't like it. And then you can come
5	and share that at that time.
6	Other than that, that's pretty much the meeting,
7	and we appreciate your time, thank you.
8	BOARD CHAIRPERSON BILL CARGO: That said, without
9	objection. I'll adjourn the meeting.
10	No objections, the meeting is adjourned. Thank
11	you.
