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Jenison, Michigan 1 September 14, 2022 - 10:00 a.m. 2 3 PROCEEDINGS WATER RESOURCES COMM. JOE BUSH: Well good morning, 4 everyone. It's 10 o'clock. Welcome to the Georgetown 5 Township for the Rozeveld Ridge Drain Board of Determination. 6 7 I'm Joe Bush, your Ottawa County Water Resources Commissioner, or drain commissioner, one of the countywide 8 electeds. And one of my jobs is when we get a petition, 9 which we did from the people, is to, the next step after the 10 verification and going through the legal stuff is to hold a 11 Board of Determination because we received a petition. 12 And it's all through state Drain Code. So it's 13 state law that I hold this public hearing for the public to 14 give input on the issues that they're having. And when we do 15 that, I appoint a three-panel board, and I'll do 16 17 introductions and why I appointed these three gentlemen today. They've sat on a lot of boards for a lot of years. 18 But to get to that point we've had some water 19 concerns and water issues over in this location. Everybody 20 21 lives in a drain district or a watershed, and everybody got a mailing. So you guys obviously got the mailing because 22 23 you're here this morning. So I appreciate you taking the time to give testimony, because this board has never seen 24

this location, they don't know of any issues. I don't give

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them a heads-up because I'm in a neutral position on this.

It's not my job to educate them and give them a false sense of whether they vote for it or not. So basically they hear public testimony, and then they go from there, that's how they make their decision.

So after we get a petition, we hire an engineer to do a preliminary, not a project. There is no cost determined today, no assessment, no nothing today because we don't even have a project unless this board determines it necessary.

So we ended up hiring Spicer Engineering. We have Noah here today who is from Spicer Engineering. He's been out there. He did a preliminary, he didn't do a total fix or what the problems are. He might have spoke to some residents out there walking in their backyard.

And that's all he's doing is a preliminary, until we actually get a vote from the three-panel board whether to say, yes, move forward; or not. They could turn it down, and say, we don't think it's necessary to become a county drain, maybe some minor maintenance or whatever.

The reason I appoint this three-panel board, they
don't have any properties over there, they're not affiliated
with Georgetown Township or any other committees in
Georgetown Township at all. So it's not your Georgetown
Township board. They live outside of this drain district and
preferably outside of the township.

But they are past leaders or current leaders within 1 their organization or their township. So that's why I hire 2 3 them. The other part is, so we don't have a cost. 4 Everybody is like, what's this going to cost us? We don't 5 know that. We're here to hear testimony on the issues for 6 them to make a decision on is it determined necessary. 7 That's their only job today, does it make sense to put this 8 under Joe's department, myself, Joe, and move forward with a 9 project. That's the only reason we're here today. 10 Some people think we have a project, we'll know 11 what the fix is. We didn't hire the engineering firm to 12 spend that kind of money. If the board turns it down, we 13 14 don't want that big cost up front. We have to make sure we 15 don't do that. So moving forward, again, this is just one of our 16 17 jobs we do in the Water Resources Commissioner is hold these hearings. 18 We always have a court reporter. That's not 19 required by law, but I have that. I've been doing that since 20 21 2013, January 1st, when I got elected -- or got sworn in, I should say, I was elected in 2012. But I always have a court 22 23 reporter for my protection, the board's protection, the township's protection and the property owner's protection. 24 25 Because you can always go back and read the

If you go to the MIOttawa.org and look under Water 1 Resources Commissioner, you'll see all the petitions and all 2 3 the minutes court recorded. So then it's not somebody's interpretation of what did he say, did Joe say that, did Joe 4 say a cost? Because we get a lot of these. And I don't want 5 to get mixed in the shuffle of what did I say or what did the 6 7 board say. And it's court recorded. It's, this is what was 8 said word for word, based on the township, the board, me, 9 whoever is in the audience. So it's for everybody's 10 protection. 11 If you don't have internet access, or a way to get 12 them, you can contact our department and we're more than 13 14 happy to get those hard copies to you as well. Takes about 15 four to six weeks to get her copy. That's why I hire her. It's very simple but it's 16 17 very -- we go back in five, eight years later, I go back and read those minutes and what I said, because people forget 18 eventually. And I want to make sure I'm on the right track 19 for, again, for my constituents. 20 21 So I will go ahead and do introductions. I'll start from my left to the right of my board. Again, when I 22 appoint either ladies or gentlemen, I have ladies at times 23

too, number one, their job is they got to know how to run a

meeting. That's very critical, Robert's Rules, how to run a

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1 meeting. 2 Number two, they understand Drain Code, they've 3 been doing this a long time. And they understand the purpose of why we're here to hear public testimony and hear you talk. 4 So I pick people who have been in leadership, I pick people 5 who understand Drain Code. 6 It's very complicated, but they do understand what 7 their purpose is for here today. And definitely they 8 understand why they're here. It's not to have a project or 9 anything, it's definitely just to hear testimony and make a 10 decision. 11 Their decision is important for you guys so I want 12 to make sure I have the right people at the table when I 13 14 appoint them. So Todd Wolters is from Olive Township, he's their 15 current township supervisor in Olive. 16 17 And then in the center is Bill Cargo, he's the manager of Grand Haven Township. He has been there a long 18 time. He's been chairing these for a long time. 19 wonderful job. He asks a lot of questions, so be sure when 20 21 you speak, speak your name, address. And this is where you get to share your information, whether you're for it, against 22 23 it, it doesn't matter, they're here to hear it. Then we have Josh Westgate. Josh is a previous 24 supervisor in Wright Township, and he's very knowledgeable as 25

1	well in drainage, and how to run a meeting and what his
2	purpose is here today.
3	So these are the three gentlemen that I picked.
4	Again, Margie is our court reporter.
5	We have Rod Weersing, he's the township manager.
6	And then we have Noah from Spicer Group.
7	We have two of my staff; my secretary, Marie, and
8	my chief deputy, Josiah.
9	And we have the road commission, Jerry Olman is at
10	the road commission, he comes to a lot of these. The road
11	commission is one of our partners that we work with so he's
12	always involved and tries to give comment, if needed, because
13	there is road water in almost every drain district. So there
14	is a road somewhere or a ditch that runs into the watershed.
15	So other than that, I give these three gentlemen
16	the oath, and then they run the meeting. I'll sit back and
17	take any questions from the board later, but once I give them
18	the oath, they run the meeting.
19	Again, I'm not in favor, or not in favor of,
20	because again, by law, I have to appoint the board and have
21	them make that decision.
22	At this point I will have gentlemen, please rise
23	and raise your right hand.
24	Do you each solemnly swear that you will faithfully
25	perform and discharge the duties imposed upon you. as

1	required by law, as members of the Board of Determination,
2	appointed by the Ottawa County Water Resources Commissioner,
3	to determine the necessity to maintain, and improve the
4	Rozeveld Ridge Drain, located in Georgetown Township, in said
5	county, gentlemen?
6	(All said, "I do.")
7	WATER RESOURCES COMM. JOE BUSH: Thank you.
8	BOARD MEMBER BILL CARGO: The first thing we do is
9	we elect a chairperson and a secretary.
10	Do I have a motion to elect a chairperson?
11	BOARD MEMBER TODD WOLTERS: I'll nominate Bill
12	Cargo for Chair.
13	BOARD MEMBER JOSH WESTGATE: I will second that
14	motion.
15	BOARD MEMBER BILL CARGO: Motion made by Todd,
16	seconded by Josh for Bill Cargo, myself, to be the chair.
17	All in favor, say aye.
18	(All said, "Aye.")
19	BOARD MEMBER BILL CARGO: All opposed?
20	And it is passed.
21	Secondly, we decide who wants well obviously
22	it's going to be Todd.
23	BOARD MEMBER JOSH WESTGATE: I will make a motion
24	that Todd Wolters serve as secretary.
25	BOARD CHAIRPERSON BILL CARGO: I will suppose that

1	motion.
2	We have a motion and support.
3	All in favor, say aye.
4	(All said, "Aye.")
5	BOARD CHAIRPERSON BILL CARGO: And, Todd, you are
6	the secretary for this.
7	And then we have rules for public comment.
8	Basically these are time limits on how long we go. You can
9	summarize War And Peace in about three minutes, so that's
10	normally what we put for the comments. We want to hear your
11	comments, but if you would limit them to three minutes, we'd
12	appreciate it.
13	All in favor of limiting public comments to three
14	minutes, say aye.
15	(All said, "Aye.")
16	BOARD CHAIRPERSON BILL CARGO: And there is support
17	for that.
18	Next we've already talked about the outline of the
19	determination process. Joe Bush did during the introduction.
20	So now we're going to hear the engineer.
21	Who is going to give a presentation on this? I'm
22	sorry, I've not met you before.
23	ENGINEER NOAH SZOTT: Noah.
24	BOARD CHAIRPERSON BILL CARGO: I have met you
25	before, I think. I'm sorry, Noah. That's my fault.

1	Noah, would you give a presentation to this board?
2	ENGINEER NOAH SZOTT: Thank you, Board.
3	Like Joe said earlier, I'm Noah Szott, I work with
4	Spicer Group. And I did a preliminary inspection of the
5	Rozeveld Ridge Drain, and I'm here to present some of my
6	findings.
7	BOARD CHAIRPERSON BILL CARGO: Do you have I can
8	barely hear you. Do you have one of these that you can wear?
9	Thank you.
10	ENGINEER NOAH SZOTT: So a brief outline of my
11	presentation, we'll be looking at the location of the drain,
12	a brief background and history, drainage district boundary,
13	some photos from my inspection, and then I'll open it up to
14	questions from the board.
15	So the drain is at the red star, so it's east of
16	Hudsonville, north of 196. We're between Van Buren and Barry
17	Street, just west of 16th Avenue.
18	For the background and history of this drain, it
19	was established by 433 Agreements in three different phases,
20	in 2002, 2003 and 2004. 433 Agreement just means it was
21	established with a developer as they were building the
22	neighborhood, and then they turned it over to the Water
23	Resources Commissioner when they were done.
24	The watershed is about 38 acres. There are 71
25	parcels in that watershed. The drain length is just under

3500 feet, and the land use is all residential. 1 So this is the watershed boundary. Again, it's 2 3 this red line. And there are three different sections, just to represent three different phases, but they have all been 4 consolidated and they're treated as one drain. So we're 5 looking at the outer boundary. 6 7 And then this next slide is that same boundary over laid with topography data. The white down here is like snow 8 on the mountains and the ponds are kind of like a bluish 9 green to represent the lowest points on this page. 10 And as you can see, the boundary is kind of boxy. 11 It doesn't quite fit the topography data because generally 12 with 433s, the developer just makes the boundary the outline 13 of the neighborhood, and they don't really take into account 14 topography. 15 So if there were to be a project on this drain, we 16 17 would update the boundaries so that it matches the actual watershed that contributes water to the drain. 18 And then again, this is just another map of the 19 watershed. And I'll highlight this yellow circle because 20 21 that's where a lot of the complaints and issues are, so that's where the majority of my photos will be taken from. 22 So this first photo is of saturated sod, which is 23 kind of hard to take a photo to represent that so I tried to 24 take a video to show it. Let's see if this works. 25

You can see my boot is kind of squishing around and 1 2 water is coming up around it. 3 Now on the day of my inspection this was actually, one of the neighbors had just finished irrigating their lawn. 4 So it's not rain water, but sprinkler water. But it 5 demonstrates that if there were to be a heavy enough rain, 6 the ground would act like this. 7 So this is the only picture that's outside of that 8 yellow circle. When I did my inspection I walked the whole 9 drain, top to bottom, and there is a black pipe underneath 10 those rocks. And that metal flared end section is supposed 11 to be attached to the pipe, but clearly it is not. 12 It's kind of a minor issue, but it would be 13 14 something that would need to be fixed if there was a project. And then there is a retaining wall in that yellow 15 circle. And it shows signs of water seepage and soil seepage 16 17 from underneath from water that comes down the hill, and the lack of drainage. And then this wall will also be visible in 18 some of the upcoming photos which were taken by a resident 19 during an actual rain event from earlier this year. 20 21 So this picture is flooding in the backyards, you can see there is puddles. This is taken at 7:30 p.m. on 22 August 20th, earlier this year. 23 And the next photo is 8:30 p.m., so an hour later. 24 25 Some of the larger puddles are already gone, but there is

still minor standing water in the yards. And these photos 1 2 are looking southeast. 3 The next photo is looking northeast from the same point. And you can see there is puddles, again, in the rear 4 lots, and this was taken at 8:30 as well. 5 The next photo is 6:30 the next morning and the 6 7 puddles are gone. I can't tell if the sod is still saturated, but there is no standing water. 8 And then the next photo is the very next day on 9 August 22, and you can see there are still no puddles. 10 Again, I can't tell if the sod is saturated, but there is no 11 standing water. 12 And the last photo is looking southeast, and the 13 14 retaining wall is in that photo. And again there is no puddles, no standing water. 15 So the next steps in this process, if this project 16 17 is found not necessary today, there will be no petition project. There will be potential maintenance like Joe can go 18 in and still has some money to fix some minor issues, he can 19 fix the flared end, but there would be no major project on 20 21 the drain. And there is by law no new petition can be entertained on the Rozeveld Ridge Drain for one year. 22 If the project is found necessary, we'll do some 23 more in-depth engineering, final design. We might need to 24 25 get easements, might need to get permits from the state.

Once we get easements, permits and final design, we'll bid it 1 2 out to contractors. And then we'll have a Day of Review. 3 The Day of Review is the next important day for folks out there. We'll send out a notice and it's your next 4 opportunity to come into the Water Resources office and 5 discuss the project and assessments. 6 7 And then after the Day of Review we will then construct the project. 8 I'd like to open it up to questions from the board. 9 BOARD CHAIRPERSON BILL CARGO: I see actually two 10 issues here. I see the issue raised by the residents of some 11 standing water. 12 The second issue I see is that the boundaries don't 13 14 really reflect the drainage district. And so the question I 15 have is are we here today as a board to deal with the question of whether the standing water is sufficient, or are 16 17 we here to also correct the borders of this existing storm drain district? 18 ENGINEER NOAH SZOTT: We are not here to correct 19 the boundary, we are only here to determine if the standing 20 21 water is sufficient. BOARD CHAIRPERSON BILL CARGO: So no notice has 22 23 been given to the people who are outside of the boundary -this district, even though obviously water is going from 24 their area into the district? 25

1	ENGINEER NOAH SZOTT: Correct.
2	BOARD CHAIRPERSON BILL CARGO: So that could be a
3	future issue. Okay. Thank you.
4	Any other questions? Todd?
5	BOARD SECRETARY TODD WOLTERS: Not at this time.
6	BOARD CHAIRPERSON BILL CARGO: Josh?
7	BOARD MEMBER JOSH WESTGATE: Not at this time. I'd
8	like to hear public comment on this.
9	BOARD CHAIRPERSON BILL CARGO: Okay. At this
10	stage, I'll open it up for public comment.
11	The only thing I would say is I'd ask that you
12	would come to the podium, give your name and address, and if
13	you have any comments, at that time you will share them.
14	I'll start well first of all I'll start with the
15	road commission.
16	Do we have anything, Jerry, from the road
17	commission?
18	ROAD COMMISSION JERRY OLMAN: Yes, Jerry Olman with
19	the Ottawa County Road Commission.
20	Yeah, there is quite an issue here that back in the
21	early '80s, McClelland and 16th was improved. And right on
22	the bend a couple of catch basins were placed. It's a valley
23	gutter street through there. And the water there is about
24	a 70 to 80-foot drop from McClelland down to the backyards of
25	Rozeveld Ridge. And the water exits those catch basins to

1	the northwest and goes through the backyards.
2	I'd say this was done back in the '80s and Rozeveld
3	Ridge was built in the early 2000s. So at the time, you
4	know, it wasn't an issue.
5	But it's my opinion that this water wasn't properly
6	accounted for during the development, so a lot of this water
7	is what's creating the issue in the backyards, along with the
8	slope of the 80-foot drop from McClelland down.
9	BOARD CHAIRPERSON BILL CARGO: So some of the water
10	in the backyard is coming from the storm water system in the
11	streets?
12	ROAD COMMISSION JERRY OLMAN: Yes.
13	BOARD CHAIRPERSON BILL CARGO: Okay. I didn't
14	understand that. Thank you.
15	BOARD SECRETARY TODD WOLTERS: Stevendale Drive,
16	it's 80 foot? Is that where you're talking about the drop
17	from there?
18	ROAD COMMISSION JERRY OLMAN: From McClelland down
19	to the backyards on Stevendale Drive.
20	And McClelland is outside the drainage district.
21	ENGINEER NOAH SZOTT: If you look on the map, it
22	would be up here.
23	ROAD COMMISSION JERRY OLMAN: This is the curve on
24	McClelland and 16th. There is a couple of catch basins
25	here

1	ENGINEER NOAH SZOTT: Never mind.
2	ROAD COMMISSION JERRY OLMAN: that water flows
3	along this property line, and along this backyard and around
4	(indicating).
5	BOARD CHAIRPERSON BILL CARGO: So the problem
6	you're seeing is actually coming from outside of the drainage
7	district into this drainage district that doesn't really have
8	the proper boundaries?
9	ROAD COMMISSION JERRY OLMAN: Right. So my opinion
10	is the boundaries should be expanded to include that. I
11	don't know if that's something that can be done here today.
12	BOARD CHAIRPERSON BILL CARGO: Okay. Thank you,
13	Jerry.
14	Obviously there is nobody else in the front row.
15	In the second row, if anybody would like to make a
16	comment in the second row? The gentleman in the aisle?
17	Again, just give your name and address.
18	MR. LON GERBERS: Lon Gerbers, 1777 Ericridge
19	Drive. I've lived there for 18 years, we were one of the
20	first ones in the second part of the development there.
21	And I remember when the contractor was digging for
22	the pond behind my house. They were trying to put one over
23	in the area that they were talking there, and they couldn't
24	get water.
25	And so it's like, did anybody check the soil

1	composition over in that area? I've got at least a foot of
2	topsoil with clay in it in my backyard. If I go out in the
3	spring, it's mushy. In the fall, it's dry.
4	And I just wondered and since the road
5	commission says that the drainage is coming from outside the
6	area, are we going to take care of it that way? Or is it
7	going to cut into one of the other properties to go into a
8	pond?
9	That's what I'm wondering, what's going to be done
10	with it.
11	BOARD CHAIRPERSON BILL CARGO: Yeah, thank you.
12	And then in the very back?
13	MS. PAT KOOLE: My name is Pat Koole. I live at
14	5416 Stevendale drive.
15	I'm the one that kind of started this all because
16	we moved here three years ago, and the first two years for
17	sure, this year was a little bit better because it's been a
18	dry summer, but our backyard is basically like he showed the
19	pictures. You don't see standing water, but you cannot walk
20	into it, you will sink up to your ankles.
21	Two-thirds, two or three-fourths of our backyard is
22	always water, it's never without water.
23	I have pictures to show you how we try to mow our
24	lawn. I cannot let any of our grandchildren or children play
25	back there because it's a total mess. I can't put anything

back there, our backyard is totally useless. 1 2 Looking at our property, we are probably the lowest, we're the last house that was put in the development 3 and we're at the lowest edge. 4 We have four or five properties coming down the 5 hill that drain into our yard. We have the whole ridge up 6 7 above that drains into our yard. Ours was that, you know, brick wall that you saw. And it completely fell over this 8 year, so my husband put it back up again, hoping it stays a 9 little longer than a year this time. 10 We also have the drainage from 68th coming down. 11 The people that were just above us sent me some 12 pictures yesterday and that was of all the erosion that was 13 in his yard because of the water that comes down the hill 14 there. But it eventually comes into our yard. And he tried 15 to put trees around there to try and stop it or slow it down. 16 17 It didn't help. The trees are all dying, maybe from too much 18 water. It's just that there is a problem there. 19 drainage basically is not sufficient. 20 21 If you go down from us, to the drainage point that goes into the pond, all of the properties there you can see 22 are just a little bit higher on one edge than the other. 23 the drainage is not leaving our yard, it is not going past 24

the next two yards, and it's not getting into the pipe

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1	sufficiently like it should.
2	So I did speak with both this gentleman and this
3	one (indicating). They both had spoken with us or come out
4	to the property to see what was going on.
5	And I guess I just hope that maybe something can be
6	done to alleviate this situation.
7	There is a number of pools that also kind of drain
8	into the yard. So we're kind of stuck.
9	And we did not know about this problem when we
10	moved there. So we're just trying to fix it.
11	But the five people or six people that I did have
12	the petition signed by all have an issue as well. I have it
13	written down here if anybody would like to look at it.
14	But everyone that I asked to sign the petition had
15	a question and a problem of their own that is ongoing.
16	BOARD CHAIRPERSON BILL CARGO: Okay.
17	MS. PAT KOOLE: So basically that's it.
18	BOARD SECRETARY TODD WOLTERS: On the people who
19	signed the petition, how are they located from where you're
20	located? Are they your neighbors, or are they on other
21	streets?
22	MS. PAT KOOLE: They're all neighbors. Our house,
23	and then we went the four people next to us that all have
24	water in the backyard when it rains. And then three people
25	that are on the ridge above us. So they're all draining into

1	our yard as well, but they also have problems.
2	They cannot mow their yard when it gets any kind of
3	rain, they slide down their hill. They have erosion in their
4	area. Like I said, I have pictures if anyone cares to see
5	it.
6	BOARD CHAIRPERSON BILL CARGO: You can share your
7	pictures, if you want to bring them up here. That would be
8	great.
9	The other thing I think that's it for the public
10	comment because there is no other public in the room.
11	But before we do that, we did receive a file from
12	Grant and Terry Suess, and they live at 5430 Stevendale
13	Drive.
14	And they are talking about this Board of
15	Determination hearing, and they are simply saying they do not
16	want their property altered. They do not want to pay for
17	anything to alter their property, and they are not in support
18	of any improvements. They don't believe they have any
19	problems or issues.
20	And so I'll enter that into the record. Again,
21	it's a blue file from Grant and Terry Suess.
22	And we are looking right now at photos on a phone
23	from the last person who testified showing erosion above
24	their, at a higher elevation from their property.
25	Thank you.

1	MS. PAT KOOLE: You're welcome.
2	BOARD CHAIRPERSON BILL CARGO: At this point, I'm
3	going to close the period for public testimony. And we will
4	have discussion among ourselves.
5	I have a question here though, and I'm not quite
6	this is an unusual Board of Determination for me in as much
7	as there seems to be a lot of water flowing into this
8	existing drainage district from outside the drainage
9	district, that's not part of this drainage district. And
10	typically every property in the township or in the county
11	is part of some drainage district.
12	If we find that there is an issue, but part of the
13	issue is not created by this drainage district in front of us
14	today, but from water coming from outside the drainage
15	district, how would we respond as a Board of Determination?
16	Would we determine that there is a need, and then
17	simply allow the drain commissioner to expand the boundary?
18	Is that the correct procedure?
19	WATER RESOURCES COMM. JOE BUSH: Correct. We'd
20	have another, not a public hearing but actually a Day of
21	Review for the drain district.
22	BOARD CHAIRPERSON BILL CARGO: So you would then be
23	able to expand the boundaries using that methodology?
24	WATER RESOURCES COMM. JOE BUSH: Correct.
25	BOARD CHAIRPERSON BILL CARGO: Okay. That helps

1	me.
2	BOARD SECRETARY TODD WOLTERS: That's the question
3	I had.
4	BOARD CHAIRPERSON BILL CARGO: Todd, do you have
5	any questions or comments?
6	BOARD SECRETARY TODD WOLTERS: No. I think I see a
7	need here at this time. But where it's created, I guess it's
8	not up to us to decide. It will be up to you guys to figure
9	that out, the drain commissioner and stuff. Nothing more
10	frustrating than having standing water all the time in your
11	backyard.
12	BOARD MEMBER JOSH WESTGATE: Correct.
13	BOARD CHAIRPERSON BILL CARGO: Josh, do you have
14	anything you'd like to add?
15	BOARD MEMBER JOSH WESTGATE: No. I do see
16	obviously there is a need here, obviously from public
17	testimony and the pictures that was presented to us.
18	Obviously, it looks like maybe some of this may be
19	outside of the drainage district, but it looks like that's
20	something that can be corrected down the line.
21	BOARD CHAIRPERSON BILL CARGO: And for me, the
22	testimony from the Ottawa County Road Commission stating that
23	there was a problem from outside the drainage district,
24	dumping water into this drainage district without any
25	controls, to me is an important factor too. So I agree there

1	is a need for this project.
2	And as such, I am going to find the proper motion
3	to make.
4	I will make a motion that the maintenance and
5	improvements to the Rozeveld Ridge Drain, as petitioned on
6	May 7th, 2022, is necessary and conducive to the public
7	health, convenience or welfare.
8	BOARD SECRETARY TODD WOLTERS: I support that.
9	BOARD CHAIRPERSON BILL CARGO: We have a motion,
10	and support.
11	Any other discussion?
12	Then all in favor, say aye.
13	(All said, "Aye.")
14	BOARD CHAIRPERSON BILL CARGO: And so we have found
15	that this is necessary and conducive to the public health.
16	That said, any other comments from the board
17	members before we turn this over to the drain commissioner to
18	talk about the appeal process?
19	BOARD SECRETARY TODD WOLTERS: No.
20	BOARD CHAIRPERSON BILL CARGO: Joe, do you have
21	anything you want to say about the appeal process?
22	WATER RESOURCES COMM. JOE BUSH: I do.
23	If anybody wanted to appeal today's decision, you
24	can do that ten days from today, and that's through circuit
25	court. So if somebody wanted to appeal today's decision, by

1	law you can do that, but you have to file with the circuit
2	court, not our department. So just FYI.
3	BOARD CHAIRPERSON BILL CARGO: Then without
4	objection, we will adjourn this Board of Determination
5	hearing.
