3	PROCEEDINGS
4	WATER RESOURCES COMM. JOE BUSH: Good morning,
5	everyone. I'm Joe Bush, the Ottawa County Water Resources
6	Commission, also known as the Drain Commissioner.
7	I see a lot of familiar faces from previous evening
8	meetings I had over there with your associations in Wildwood
9	Springs.
10	So again, I appreciate your time this morning
11	coming for the Board of Determination for the Wildwood
12	Springs drain. Again, this is a meeting that's held because
13	I had a petition from Spring Lake Township to establish
14	potentially, depending on today's outcome, the rest of your
15	neighborhood, pretty much the whole drain district.
16	And today's meeting is basically for the necessity
17	of being a county drain. So it's not what the project is.
18	It's not a project cost. It's not related to anything but
19	whether these three gentlemen that I appoint say, yep, it's a
20	necessity to be under the Water Resources jurisdiction.
21	Currently I have over 914 county drain systems.
22	This would be just another added county drain, possibly if
23	this board determines that it's necessary.
24	And that's why we're here today. We don't know of

any major issues. I know there is a few of them that's been

mentioned to me in the past meetings, but as far as major, major flooding or basements flooding, I'm not aware of any of those.

And today is a public hearing that if there is something that we don't know about, or if Michael or Mark has had -- doesn't know or is not aware of, then be sure to talk about that today.

Today is court recorded. Margie is here, and she does everything word for word. So when it does come time for public hearing, give your name, address and talk about the issues that you're having or concerns. Again, that's why we're here today so we can hear those. I don't know what I don't know.

And having a jurisdiction over something as large as this, it would be nice to know if there is issues other than what we previously talked about. But this board needs to know that so they can make a determination.

Again, I don't make that determination today. This three-panel board does.

And you're like, well who appoints the three-panel board? I do. Being the Water Resources Commissioner in the Drain Code I appoint a three-panel board that have no properties or have no affiliation with anything with this drain district. They don't own property, they don't live there, and they're outside of the scope of any type of work

or assessment or cost or anything.

And I usually pick three panel people who actually have experience in Drain Code and have experience in drainage and have experience in the process of why we're here today. These folks have been on multiple boards. I've been doing this almost eight years -- actually eight years and they've been on a lot of different boards, a lot of different scenarios.

So that's why I appoint the three gentlemen I have.

And I'll give those introductions here in a minute.

Again, make sure you speak loudly so Margie can actually get it. And if you want to get the transcripts, they'll be online. It usually takes about four to six weeks and they will be on my website at MIOttawa.org. Look under Water Resources Commissioner, and they'll be on there.

Again, it's word for word so make sure that if you have comments, today is the time to talk about it.

We're not here to talk about a project, a cost or anything. It's just a determination to see if it should be under my jurisdiction moving forward.

So right now it's kind of an orphan drain because really who do you call if you have issues? Your association I really don't think takes care of drainage issues in the bylaws. And also the other part is who contributes, who pays for it, who assesses it? Who goes out and looks at it to see

really what's the problem?

And that all falls under my jurisdiction. So if it is a county drain after today then you have somebody to call, and that would be me. And we'd have staff go look at it as I mentioned in previous meetings, and then we'll move forward with the project later after this meeting.

But, again, this is a Board of Determination to determine the necessity of making it pretty much a county drain or not.

And that's why we're here today. Again the Township petitioned, and because Spring Lake wants to be proactive and look at these orphan drains, or what doesn't have jurisdiction, and try to help the folks out. They're constituents and you are all my constituents because I am elected and I am countywide. So, yeah, you guys are a part of a drainage system. We need to see if it needs to be under my jurisdiction or not.

Again, I'll do introductions. We have Ryan McEnhill. He is with Eng. Him and his firm work on a lot of different drainage projects across the state.

We have Chad, maybe some of you met Chad, he's my chief deputy.

CHIEF DEPUTY CHAD MEINTS: I direct traffic.

WATER RESOURCES COMM. JOE BUSH: He directs

traffic. He was going from the front door to the back door

because the front door isn't currently working.

And then we have Sara, I'm not sure where she went, but she was having people sign in. She's my secretary.

And we have Stacy Hissong who is here with us today as a guest. She's legal counsel for the MACDC and she does a lot of legal work for me as well for easements or other type of legal things that we run into in my department. So she's a part of that.

She just wanted to come and I guess be an observer and listen and see how things went today.

And then my three-panel board going from right to left is George VanderKlok from Georgetown Township, he's a board member over there and he's been on quite a few of these. He understands again, Drain Code, drainage, and his township kind of deals with the same things.

In the center is Bill Cargo. He's Grand Haven

Township manager and again he's been on these for years. And
he understands the process, and how it works.

And then we have Ken Souter. Ken Souter worked with the Road Commission for, I always get this wrong, was it almost 40 years?

BOARD MEMBER KEN SOUTER: Yes.

WATER RESOURCES COMM. JOE BUSH: So he has a lot of experience in the engineering department at the Road Commission. He's now retired, but he knows Drain Code and

understands drainage as well. So that's why I picked this three panel.

2.0

And again we have Margie again, our court reporter.

And I don't see anybody here from the Road

Commission or Spring Lake Township. Usually they're here,

but I don't see anybody. So I guess they're okay with it

since they're not here. Right?

I don't think I'm missing anybody.

So after I give these three gentlemen the oath, they'll run the meeting. If you have any questions, be sure to contact -- or be sure I guess to forward your question to them and then they'll turn around and question me. But they'll run the meeting. I pretty much will sit back and just be an observer and just let them do their -- what they're supposed to be doing.

So, gentlemen, please rise. I'll give you the oath. Raise your right hand, please.

Do each of you solemnly swear that you will faithfully perform and discharge the duties imposed upon you as required by law as members of the Board of Determination appointed by the Ottawa County Water Resources Commissioner to determine the necessity for maintenance and improvement to the Wildwood Springs No. 5 Drain, located in Spring Lake Township, in said county?

BOARD MEMBER KEN SOUTER: I will.

1	BOARD MEMBER BILL CARGO: I shall.
2	BOARD MEMBER RICH VANDERKLOK: I will.
3	WATER RESOURCES COMM. JOE BUSH: Thank you.
4	BOARD MEMBER BILL CARGO: The first thing we need
5	to do is elect both a chair and a secretary.
6	Is there a motion to for the chair position?
7	BOARD MEMBER KEN SOUTER: I'll make a motion that
8	Bill Cargo be the chair.
9	BOARD MEMBER RICH VANDERKLOK: Support.
10	BOARD MEMBER BILL CARGO: Well we have a motion on
11	the floor. And if there is no further discussion, we will
12	take a motion we will take a role call not a role call.
13	We will take vote on that.
14	All in favor, say aye.
15	BOARD MEMBER KEN SOUTER: Aye.
16	BOARD MEMBER BILL CARGO: Aye.
17	BOARD MEMBER RICH VANDERKLOK: Aye.
18	BOARD MEMBER BILL CARGO: Opposed?
19	And so I will act as a chair for this Board of
20	Determination.
21	BOARD CHAIRPERSON BILL CARGO: That said, I will
22	make a motion that Ken act as secretary of the Board of
23	Determination. Do I have support?
24	BOARD MEMBER RICH VANDERKLOK: Support.
25	BOARD CHAIRPERSON BILL CARGO: Made by me,

1	supported by Rich.
2	All in favor, say aye.
3	BOARD MEMBER KEN SOUTER: Aye.
4	BOARD CHAIRPERSON BILL CARGO: Aye.
5	BOARD MEMBER RICH VANDERKLOK: Aye.
6	BOARD CHAIRPERSON BILL CARGO: And so, Ken, you
7	have the privilege of trying to keep all the notes. And I've
8	seen your handwriting, so I hope we can decipher that.
9	The other thing we're going to do is typically we
10	try to limit public comments to three minutes. You can
11	summarize War and Peace within three minutes, and so we're
12	going to make a motion that public comments be limited to
13	three minutes.
14	So I will make a motion that public comments shall
15	be limited to three minutes per person.
16	Do I have support for that?
17	BOARD MEMBER RICH VANDERKLOK: Support.
18	BOARD CHAIRPERSON BILL CARGO: So we have a motion
19	and support. Any discussion?
20	BOARD SECRETARY KEN SOUTER: No.
21	BOARD CHAIRPERSON BILL CARGO: Seeing none, all in
22	favor, say aye.
23	BOARD SECRETARY KEN SOUTER: Aye.
24	BOARD CHAIRPERSON BILL CARGO: Aye.
25	BOARD MEMBER RICH VANDERKLOK: Aye.

BOARD CHAIRPERSON BILL CARGO: And so that is 1 2 something we will do. 3 The other thing is that we will start with getting 4 some comments from the -- we've already outlined the 5 procedure. 6 So, Joe, do you have anything you want to add at 7 this point? WATER RESOURCES COMM. JOE BUSH: I don't believe 8 9 SO. 10 BOARD CHAIRPERSON BILL CARGO: Okay. Then what I'm 11 going to do I'm going to ask the engineer, Ryan, to give a 12 PowerPoint presentation. 13 Ryan, if you could take the lead in this now, I'd 14 appreciate it. 15 ENGINEER RYAN McENHILL: Yep, thank you. 16 My name is Ryan McEnhill with Eng. I run our Grand 17 Haven office. We also have an office in Lansing, Michigan, but we work with drain commissioners, water resources 18 19 commissioners, all across the state from Ann Arbor all the 2.0 way up to Traverse City, so this is something that we're 2.1 familiar with and the process that goes along with it. 22 So just to give you a brief overview of this 23 process, and Joe touched on it briefly, a petition was filed 24 with the Township. This is actually what we call a Chapter 8

petition, which is for maintenance and improvements.

And when Wildwood Springs was originally constructed, I think the first phase went in in 1993, none of these were established as county drain systems. It wasn't until the fifth phase of Wildwood Springs where that phase was actually established as a county drain. So that's why it's referred to as Wildwood Springs No. 5.

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So what we're looking to have happen with this particular petition is to, of course, do maintenance improvements but also to extend branches and add lands to the district.

So instead of just being the fifth phase of Wildwood Springs, we're talking about actually doing a major expansion to include all the phases within Wildwood Springs, and then everything in the watershed that actually contributes to that system. And I'm going to talk about that a little bit further.

So Joe talked about the procedural stuff so I'm not going to get into that too much.

Just some of the things that we've done to this point, so when Joe brings us on to do -- just get some background on the system, we try to spend the minimal amount of funds as possible for the major reason that if this board were to find this project not necessary, we don't want to have accumulated a bunch of costs that have to be assessed back.

So we try to keep it to a minimum amount at this point. And then if a project moves forward, obviously we get into a more detailed analysis of the system, rely on comments that you give us, where problem issues are at.

But so to this point we've delineated the watershed which is the pink line on this map and that's everything that's contributing to this system.

We try to track down original plat maps, back from the original Wildwood Springs all the way through the fifth phase, and then there is actually two other site condos that are included. I think one is called Parson's Walk, and there is The Cottages. There are two more that we tried to track down.

And then we did do a brief field inspection.

Obviously a lot of this system is enclosed underneath the road, and it's a pretty extensive system of ponds and wetlands that we just took a brief look at to evaluate their condition.

And then, you know, our objective is just to give an independent and unbiased assessment to this board so they have enough information, along with your public comments, to make their decision today.

So this is a district -- a district boundary overview. Basically the first thing that we did was, you know, in addition to all these orange lines on this map,

which designated existing enclosed storm sewer system, we also talked about finding an adequate outlet for all this system.

So you see this dark blue line here which actually extends all the way to 174th, right near Van Wagoner. I think you're probably familiar with that box culvert that goes under the road.

We wanted to make sure we established at least a positive outlet to that point so that, you know, if issues down here were causing problems further up in the district, that we would at least have the ability to clean that, do maintenance on it.

So based on Joe's and I's discussion we decided to try to take that over as county drain as well all the way to 174th.

So based on that, we look at our downstream point of ending and we try to determine what are the lands that are contributing water to this system.

We used county mapping. They have really good LiDAR data that gives us one-foot contours that we can try to figure out what's actually contributing.

In this case there is actually two different county drains adjacent to it. The VanderKolk and also the Feenstra here which we recently delineated as well, I think within the last three years.

So if you're not in this district, if you're up here, your water is going to the Feenstra. If you're down here, your water is going to the VanderKolk drain. So that's how we come up with that watershed boundary.

And then it's primarily Spring Lake Township. You see 297 acres there, and then a very, very small portion is in the city of Ferrysburg as well.

So Joe mentioned the orphan drain system. So other than phase five of this development, all the previous four, all the infrastructure that's there is considered private. So if you were to have a pipe failure underneath the road, that destroyed the road, basically the association would be on the hook to fix it, you know. You might -- the Road Commission obviously doesn't have jurisdiction over it. You could maybe get the township to pay for it.

So the whole basis of the hearing today is to try to get this established as public infrastructure as a legally established county drain. So if something like that were to happen, you guys could pick up the phone, call Joe, he has jurisdiction over it now and he could actually make the repairs and get it fixed in a timely fashion.

BOARD CHAIRPERSON BILL CARGO: Can I follow up on that?

You talk about this being an orphan drain meaning that it's a private system, there is nobody legally

responsible for it. 1 2 ENGINEER RYAN McENHILL: Correct. 3 BOARD CHAIRMAN BILL CARGO: From what I understand, 4 you cannot spend public monies on a private drain system. 5 Is that understanding correct? 6 ENGINEER RYAN McENHILL: Correct. So --7 BOARD CHAIRPERSON BILL CARGO: And the reason I say 8 that is that one of the main reasons that people want to 9 bring orphan drain systems into the public drain system is so 10 that if repairs happen, typically there is a formula where 11 the municipalities would pay for a portion of it, the county 12 road commission would pay for a portion of it, and that would 13 reduce the costs directly to the property owners within the 14 district. 15 So not only would they benefit by having somebody 16 responsible, but there is public monies available, but only 17 if it's a public system. 18 ENGINEER RYAN McENHILL: Correct. 19 BOARD CHAIRPERSON BILL CARGO: The other thing is 2.0 there is nobody from Spring Lake Township here, but most 2.1 communities also have a project where if there is minor 22 maintenance, in Grand Haven Township it's less than 10,000, 23 we would just pay for that from our general fund without 24 going through the assessment process.

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I suspect Spring Lake Township has something like

1	that. Maybe they do, maybe they don't. But for minor
2	maintenance it would allow us to eliminate the assessment
3	process and deal with small maintenances of \$10,000 or less.
4	ENGINEER RYAN McENHILL: Absolutely.
5	BOARD CHAIRPERSON BILL CARGO: And then what I also
6	understand, the drain commission can also spend monies up to
7	5,000 a mile, I believe?
8	WATER RESOURCES COMM. JOE BUSH: That's correct,
9	per drain, per year.
10	BOARD CHAIRPERSON BILL CARGO: Per drain. So again
11	those monies are only available if it's part of the public
12	system.
13	Is that understanding correct?
14	ENGINEER RYAN McENHILL: You are correct.
15	BOARD CHAIRPERSON BILL CARGO: Okay. Thank you.
16	I just wanted to say that because you talked a lot
17	about costs, and I wanted to say one of the benefits they
18	often cite for moving from an orphan drain to a public drain
19	is the fact that public monies are then made available to
20	maintain and repair.
21	ENGINEER RYAN McENHILL: Right.
22	BOARD CHAIRMAN BILL CARGO: Okay. Thank you.
23	WATER RESOURCES COMM. JOE BUSH: Just to be clear,
24	on the 5,000 per mile, that's not money that's just there.
25	That 5.000 still usually comes from the municipalities or the

1 people. 2 BOARD CHAIRPERSON BILL CARGO: Okay. 3 WATER RESOURCES COMM. JOE BUSH: It's not just 4 5,000 the state gives me to do maintenance. 5 BOARD CHAIRPERSON BILL CARGO: Okay. 6 ENGINEER RYAN McENHILL: Yep. So I think I talked 7 a little bit about the existing conditions that are out 8 there. All these purple lines are existing enclosed storm 9 sewer systems that we would be looking to take over as county 10 drain systems. 11 And then also we evaluated this darker blue line. 12 The thing with that is we would have to obtain easements for 13 We would have to -- because it is private, we do have to 14 obtain easements from private landowners, in some cases, to 15 make that a public system. 16 The one thing that happened in -- you know, as 17 these plats were staged out, you know, one through five, is that even though they didn't actually go through the full 18 19 process of making each of these a drainage district, they did 2.0 grant drainage easements to the Drain Commissioner/Water 21 Resources Commissioner. 22 So we wouldn't have to go back and actually obtain 23 these easements. They're there. The problem was they didn't 24 take the final step to make these county drain systems

through a 433 Agreement. So there wasn't any funding

mechanism to be able to assess people.

So even though the easements are there in some cases, currently they don't have the funding mechanism to actually assess folks and public municipalities to pay for that. So this is the next step to do that.

And then I just want to briefly go through just some of the existing conditions. I think for the most part we're going to rely a lot on what we hear from you folks today.

There is obviously a lot of open water ponds in the system. Some of it we noticed signs of stagnation, some algae growth. You think about a system that was setup in 1993 all the way to today in 2019, that's probably never been maintained since. Storm water standards have changed quite a bit since then as far as we do -- we focus on a lot of pretreatment now so we're treating the water before it gets to these ponds so we can try to minimize the amount of sediment that gets into them.

So there is probably a lot of sediment accumulation in these ponds that just needs proper maintenance to function properly.

You know, a lot of the channels between the ponds have seen just a lot of vegetation overgrowth and things like that. Again, just from not having maintenance being done over time.

And then there is just culverts and things like that that, you know, eventually you get accumulations, you get logs buildup at the front end of them, you get vegetation buildup. This is just something that we observed when we were out there in the last two weeks.

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And then just a few more photos, kind of indicative of those same type of conditions.

So like we said, there is nothing out there, and Joe mentioned this previously, where you can just go there and look at and say, that's a major issue, that has got to get fixed. We didn't see any of that.

It's just being proactive about maintenance, you know. As you get to a 20, 30-year-old system things are going to start popping up. It's a good idea to have a mechanism in place to be able to fix those.

So at this point, again, we rely on public testimony. Obviously all you folks live out there. You know the issues. We rely a lot on you to tell us what the issues are, and then we investigate on those further.

The Board is going to determine the necessity of the petition. You know, if they determine that it's not necessary, then, you know, the project ends, and this stays as a private system, except for number five, which is just that small phase of Wildwood Springs in the whole.

But if it is found necessary, I think we'd sit down

together with the county, try to figure out, you know, based on what we've heard, how we're going to maybe do some periodic maintenance, have a maintenance schedule to be able to keep the system operating how it was originally designed.

There may be the chance where we have to get some

There may be the chance where we have to get some easements and some permitting depending on what we do. And a lot of times these days we do have scope meetings and informational meetings just to try to let everybody know, keep you up to speed on what we're thinking about doing, and then we can get feedback from you, not only if that's a good solution or if there is something else that we maybe should be addressing as well.

I guess that's all I have for the Board. If the Board has any questions for me, I'd be happy to answer them.

BOARD CHAIRPERSON BILL CARGO: Ken, any questions?

BOARD SECRETARY KEN SOUTER: No.

BOARD CHAIRPERSON BILL CARGO: Rich?

BOARD MEMBER RICH VANDERKLOK: No.

BOARD CHAIRPERSON BILL CARGO: Just a quick

20 | question, just as a follow up.

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You talked about you didn't see any major maintenance, you talked about the maintenance that is out there. It sounds like it's mostly sedimentation and the clearing of vegetation that has encroached into the waterways.

1	ENGINEER RYAN McENHILL: Correct.
2	BOARD CHAIRPERSON BILL CARGO: Okay, simple.
3	At this point we're going to begin taking public
4	testimony. I'm going to start at the front row and work my
5	way back. And as I point, we'd simply ask that you come up
6	to the podium. We don't have a mic so you need to speak loud
7	enough so the court reporter can hear what you say. Please
8	we'd ask that you give your name and address and then any
9	public comments.
10	So I'll start in the very front row, and the very
11	first person there? Would you like to make any comments?
12	No?
13	Any in this row? Okay.
14	I'll go back to the second row, the gentleman in
15	the red shirt, would you like to make a comment?
16	MR. EDWARD DeKEIP: Yes.
17	BOARD CHAIRPERSON BILL CARGO: Come up to the
18	podium so the court reporter can clearly hear your name and
19	address.
20	MR. EDWARD DeKEIP: Ed DeKeip, 17813 174th Avenue.
21	I have a question and then a comment for the engineer.
22	I'm wondering why the district has stopped at 174th
23	Avenue and nothing east of that is shown. The drain that you
24	put on the map there continues under the box culvert at 174th
25	Avenue and goes all the way to the bayou at Spring Lake.

So wouldn't it make more sense to have that entire system included?

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BOARD CHAIRPERSON BILL CARGO: Ryan, could you answer that? I think it goes into another system, but if you could respond, I'd appreciate it.

ENGINEER RYAN McENHILL: So ultimately it outlets to Spring Lake, and it was a decision both Joe and I discussed early on, how far do we want to extend the system.

The thing it comes down to is the further we have to go, the more easements we have to obtain, and the longer the project takes. We wanted to come, I guess, to a happy medium.

And, Joe, you can feel free to chime in too.

We wanted to find a meeting of, okay, what's reasonable. We start acquiring -- we go from a project that maybe we have to acquire two easements to now we have to acquire ten to get down to Spring Lake, the project cost goes up, and maybe we don't get the benefit by extending it further.

So it's kind of an analysis there that we had to go through that this just seemed to make the most sense.

BOARD CHAIRPERSON BILL CARGO: So you would be able to add that at a future date if you find that you're having maintenance issues with that segment of drain?

WATER RESOURCES COMM. JOE BUSH: That's correct.

1	The other issue that we could run into, if you
2	don't mind, Mr. Chair, is wetland issues. We could maybe not
3	even get the permits if we went further. So it would be a
4	waste of time and money because we might not even be able to
5	do the work we planned on if we went further south.
6	So I want to at least get this established. And
7	then if there is issues further down, we might be able to
8	look at that
9	BOARD CHAIRPERSON BILL CARGO: You could then
10	extend the drain district at that time?
11	WATER RESOURCES COMM. JOE BUSH: That's correct.
12	BOARD CHAIRPERSON BILL CARGO: Or create a new one.
13	WATER RESOURCES COMM. JOE BUSH: Right.
14	BOARD CHAIRPERSON BILL CARGO: Does that answer
15	your question?
16	MR. EDWARD DeKEIP: Somewhat. I'm still concerned
17	that you approve the drainage in the district, but don't
18	provide an outlet for any of the drainage to leave that
19	district and get to the bayou.
20	BOARD CHAIRPERSON BILL CARGO: It sounds like they
21	have a positive outlet, but I understand your concern that if
22	somewhere downstream in the positive outlet they have some
23	issues, they may be back in this room five to ten years from
24	now.

WATER RESOURCES COMM. JOE BUSH: And there is a

1	possibility that once this all happens, we get a route and
2	course that does stop at 174th, in Drain Code there is a
3	provision that if there was an emergency removal of something
4	that would flood people out downstream, we could go remove
5	that further downstream based on property permission.
6	So if we have to get individual permission to be on
7	that property to remove the dam, then we could do that, if
8	it's flooding people out upstream.
9	BOARD CHAIRPERSON BILL CARGO: All I would do is I
10	think the Board would agree that is keep that in mind.
11	WATER RESOURCES COMM. JOE BUSH: Right.
12	BOARD CHAIRPERSON BILL CARGO: That if we need to
13	address that issue at a future date, we do. But right now
14	that's not in front of us, and it's beyond the scope of this
15	Board to expand the district to that extent.
16	WATER RESOURCES COMM. JOE BUSH: That's correct.
17	BOARD SECRETARY KEN SOUTER: Joe, could I ask one
18	more question on that same subject?
19	Joe, if we're talking to the east of 174th Avenue
20	down to the bayou, is that what would be considered a natural
21	watercourse or
22	WATER RESOURCES COMM. JOE BUSH: That's correct.
23	BOARD MEMBER RICH VANDERKLOK: or has that been
24	a ditch dug by someone.
25	WATER RESOURCES COMM. JOE BUSH: It's a natural

water course.

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BOARD CHAIRPERSON BILL CARGO: It sounds like the question was, is this a natural watercourse, or is it something that's been ditched out in the past. It sounds like it may have been ditched out in the 1960s. Again, for the purposes of this public hearing that's an interesting question because it does change how they would go about bringing that into a system, but that's not what's in front of us today.

WATER RESOURCES COMM. JOE BUSH: That's correct. I believe that's not a county drain. If that was a county drain, we wouldn't be having this discussion.

BOARD CHAIRPERSON BILL CARGO: Okay. The gentleman in the cap.

MR. DAVE PETERSON: Yes, Dave Peterson, 17788

Dogwood Drive.

That was never an established drain. I know we had talked about it years ago, and it never happened. And the last time that was, I want to say it was in the mid '60s when my granddad had that dug out --

BOARD CHAIRPERSON BILL CARGO: Okay.

MR. DAVE PETERSON: -- all the way from -- he used to own the 15 acres that butted up against Wildwood Springs. So that area was dug from there to Smith's bayou where it goes underneath the highway.

So, yeah, I'm afraid you're just going to flood us 1 2 out. 3 BOARD CHAIRPERSON BILL CARGO: They'll have to 4 watch that, and I think we have that into the record. 5 need to take a look at that. If they need to extend the 6 County drain, we would need to. 7 We don't want to solve one person's problem, the Water Resources Commissioner does not want to solve one 8 9 problem while creating others. They will have to monitor 10 that. I appreciate it. 11 MR. DAVE PETERSON: Thank you. The gentleman on the BOARD CHAIRPERSON BILL CARGO: 12 13 end of the second row? 14 MR. LARRY DUNN: Larry Dunn, 17797 Woodcreek. 15 in the Parson's Walk complex. And right next to my house in 16 the back of my yard is a large drain, and then there is a 17 10-foot easement that comes out and goes out to the street 18 and down. And from what I can see, you didn't draw the 19 ponds, but everyone of these drains into a pond. 2.0 ENGINEER RYAN McENHILL: (Indicating). 2.1 MR. LARRY DUNN: So when it rains, it comes up, 22 dirt, everything goes into that cistern that's back there, 2.3 and all the leaves and everything else. 24 And then when I moved in about '97, '98, shortly 25 after we were there, we -- our basements, my neighbors on

both sides, we were flooded. 1 2 So then we got a hold of Bos and they come along 3 and put eavestroughs around our houses and ran rubber tubing 4 down to that pipe, and put into it. 5 Since then -- and the water table on our side is 6 very, right to the basement. So on the back street, what Bos 7 did, they raised everything four feet on the back street. So the hundred-year flood comes, we're going to get 8 9 water again, even if we're running in that drain. So I'm 10 concerned that that drain and everything else, that it's not 11 enough. 12 BOARD CHAIRPERSON BILL CARGO: 13 MR. LARRY DUNN: So we have a valley behind us, 14 they have walkouts and that's where the problem is. 15 BOARD CHAIRPERSON BILL CARGO: So you believe there 16 is a need to take a review of how the drain system is 17 currently working. 18 MR. LARRY DUNN: Exactly. The original 19 engineering, they weren't low enough. And Dogwood was the 2.0 same issue they had over there with flooding. 2.1 And the other issue with Parson's Walk, we pay, my 22 assessment there is so much that goes in and they take care 23 of the two ponds that we drain into. 2.4 BOARD CHAIRPERSON BILL CARGO: 25 MR. LARRY DUNN: They treat those ponds.

1	BOARD CHAIRPERSON BILL CARGO: Okay. They treat
2	them but they don't remove the sedimentation that occurs
3	MR. LARRY DUNN: No, I don't believe.
4	BOARD CHAIRPERSON BILL CARGO: I appreciate that.
5	Thank you.
6	Second row, first seat? Your name and address.
7	MR. MICHAEL KURAS: Michael Kuras, 18246 Lost Creek
8	Lane.
9	First a question. The presentation that we heard
10	today, regardless of the determination, where will it be
11	available for public inspection?
12	BOARD CHAIRPERSON BILL CARGO: First I think they
13	will give you a copy of it. If not, we will have some extra
14	copies up there.
15	But will this be posted on the website, the
16	presentation made by Ryan?
17	WATER RESOURCES COMM. JOE BUSH: That's correct.
18	BOARD CHAIRPERSON BILL CARGO: And it will also be
19	posted on the website that the Water Resources Commissioner
20	discussed.
21	MR. MICHAEL KURAS: Thank you.
22	Also, Mr. Cargo, could you explain or clarify the
23	jurisdiction of the district with respect to wetlands?
24	Wildwood Springs includes a significant amount of wetlands as
25	well as ponds, and we want to understand the jurisdiction of

1	the Water Resources Commissioner with respect to those, if it
2	becomes a drain district. Thank you.
3	BOARD CHAIRPERSON BILL CARGO: If it becomes a
4	drain district, he will have to work with the Michigan
5	Department of Environmental Quality to receive permits before
6	he works within the wetlands.
7	Is that correct, Joe?
8	WATER RESOURCES COMM. JOE BUSH: That's correct.
9	BOARD CHAIRPERSON BILL CARGO: He would not
10	supersede the Michigan Department of Environmental Quality,
11	which has now been changed to
12	WATER RESOURCES COMM. JOE BUSH: EGLE.
13	BOARD CHAIRPERSON BILL CARGO: I think it's
14	EGLE, I don't know what that means yet, but we will learn
15	over the coming year.
16	Next on the second row? Yourself? Neither one.
17	Next?
18	MR. MARC MORIN: My name is Marc Morin, Marc is
19	spelled with a C, M-A-R-C; Morin is M-O-R-I-N. I live at
20	18092 Wildwood court.
21	I am currently the president of Wildwood Springs
22	Property Owner's Association, of which we have 174 homes. We
23	are a relatively new community, we're only 26 years old, in
24	the big scheme of things.
25	However we want to be very proactive regarding our

community. We have ponds, as you well know, as well as 1 2 streams that feed from one pond to another. 3 We have received many comments from neighbors, I 4 have, and our board, regarding sentiment regarding how the 5 water flows from one pond to another, and some issues that have come up regarding beavers. Yes, there are beavers that 6 7 come and love our community as well. 8 So again, we want to be very proactive, and on 9 behalf of the board we support the creation of a drain 10 district for Wildwood Springs, and district five. 11 And I do want to make mention that we also are concerned about what happens downstream as well. We just 12 13 don't want things to kind of back up. So we'd like that to be looked at. 14 15 So thank you. 16 BOARD CHAIRPERSON BILL CARGO: I appreciate it. 17 We're going to go to the third row on my right-hand 18 If you would again just come up and give your name and 19 address. 2.0 MR. JACK KETCHUM: Your right hand side, my left hand side. 2.1 22 BOARD CHAIRPERSON BILL CARGO: I said my right-hand 23 side. 24 MR. JACK KETCHUM: Good morning. I'm Jack Ketchum,

K-E-T-C-H-U-M, 17858 Woodcreek Lane.

I also happen to be on the Wetlands Review Board for Spring Lake Township as well as I'm the Planning Commissioner there.

2.0

But I'm here as a citizen and a resident of Parson's Walk. And it was interesting that Mr. Morin mentioned the beavers because it kind of fits in with this gentleman's comment as well.

I live downstream from where the beavers typically build their dam, and the two creeks that come out both co-join in my backyard.

It doesn't bother me when the beaver is there; unfortunately anyone upstream from there, it does bother them. That fits into what you were saying as well, when something happens downstream it just keeps going back up. As a good plumber know, you have to have a downhill flow to make the refuse flow.

So -- and we have already paid for that beaver removal. When that happened, we hire a guy to come in, somebody is really brave and wants to go in and fork that stuff apart. And they've had to trap a number of critters out as well.

One of the first slides that Ryan showed, I think the first slide of the photo, was actually my and my next door neighbor's backyard. And you will see it's a very beautiful stream where it goes through there.

And of course I'm concerned if there has to be some sort of maintenance done that involves getting to the water, if you look at the slide, you realize that's all rock lined and we've taken great care to keep it beautiful.

2.0

So unlike in the agricultural situation where you take a backhoe and go in and dig a hole, I would hope that they're not going in and removing the rocks which actually stabilizes that creek. Because they're not just on the edge, they're also at the bottom all the way through that so that keeps a good flowing thing.

So that is a concern of mine. If maintenance had to be done beyond the banks, how would that be handled in the creek.

You talked about an orphan drain as it is now versus a public drain. And I'm not certain I quite understood your response to that because the question was raised by the chair, well public funds wouldn't be available for private drains.

Do I understand you then to say that if this were to be accepted as a drain by the board, and it were to become, it then becomes public so it's available for public money or is that a question?

BOARD CHAIRPERSON BILL CARGO: You can direct the question to me.

MR. JACK KETCHUM: Sorry.

BOARD CHAIRPERSON BILL CARGO: But you are correct, 1 2 if it is a public drain, there are formulas within the public 3 Drain Code that would pass some of the costs directly to the 4 municipalities. 5 When we make a motion today, we make a motion, I 6 believe, both to make it into a public drain if it's 7 something we approve. I think we also, at least we used to, make a motion saying that some of the costs would be assessed 8 9 to the various municipalities and county organizations. 10 MR. JACK KETCHUM: Okay. BOARD CHAIRPERSON BILL CARGO: As far as the other 11 question you had about the banks and what would happen there, 12 13 the drain commissioner does that on a case-by-case basis. 14 He'll have to go in there and examine what the situation is. 15 I know he's won awards for being sensitive to the 16 environment. I think he would also be sensitive to the 17 environment here. He's a public official. He is elected. He wants 18 19 to do something that's going to be beneficial to everybody 2.0 involved. 2.1 Is that a fair statement, Joe? 22 WATER RESOURCES COMM. JOE BUSH: That is correct. 23 BOARD CHAIRPERSON BILL CARGO: Thank you very much. 2.4 MR. JACK KETCHUM: Thank you. 25 BOARD CHAIRPERSON BILL CARGO: And the next in

1	line?
2	MS. MARTHA KETCHUM: I just have a question.
3	BOARD CHAIRPERSON BILL CARGO: Again I need your
4	name and address.
5	MS. MARTHA KETCHUM: My name is Martha Ketchum,
6	17858 Woodcreek Lane.
7	I just have a question, so I think I will address
8	them to Mr. Bush.
9	BOARD CHAIRPERSON BILL CARGO: You need to address
10	them to me. If you want to address them to Mr. Bush, you can
11	talk to him after the meeting.
12	MS. MARTHA KETCHUM: I'll do that.
13	BOARD CHAIRPERSON BILL CARGO: Okay, that will be
14	great.
15	Next gentleman?
16	MR. PAUL HUGO: Paul Hugo, 18283 Lost Creek Lane.
17	If I'm hearing things as they stand now it is a
18	healthy watershed, is it not? That's kind of my first
19	question.
20	BOARD CHAIRPERSON BILL CARGO: Okay, I don't think
21	we're really addressing the issue of whether it's a healthy
22	watershed or not. And I guess I don't want to get involved
23	in that because we're not here to talk about the health of
24	the watershed. We're here to talk about the storm water and
	1

what is happening with the existing storm drains and ponds.

What we have heard is that sedimentation has occurred. And we've also heard that vegetation is growing into some of the drains and connectors which reduces the flow of the water, and that causes issues.

2.0

2.1

I don't want to get into a -- that's a question I don't think anybody here will be able to respond to.

MR. PAUL HUGO: Fair enough, and I want to thank all of you for being here. We as citizens really appreciate you taking the time to be here today.

BOARD CHAIRPERSON BILL CARGO: Next gentleman.

MR. JOHN NORTH: I'm John North. I live at 17816 Wildwood Springs Parkway.

And I'm president of The Cottages Association which is one of the member associations of the Wildwood Springs

Property Owner's Association. And I bring general support from The Cottages for this project. We think it will be valuable and helpful. We think it will save us money, and we think it will be more effective than our efforts so far have been to do this privately.

I would say that I'm happy to see that the outlet between Wildwood Springs and 174th is included in this because it's a major -- it's the only outlet for the entire drain system, and it frequently becomes blocked. We have no access to that because it's not in Wildwood Springs property.

And so the only way to clear that is gorilla kind

of action that's clandestinely done by residents who want to 1 2 see it completed. 3 So that's very helpful to us to have that outlet 4 cleared, and efficiently drain the rest of the system. 5 We also like to see that you've included the 6 properties north of Taft since they also contribute water 7 into the system and need to share in its maintenance. 8 Thank you. 9 BOARD CHAIRPERSON BILL CARGO: Next? 10 MR. HOYT FONGER: Hello. My name is Hoyt Fonger. 11 That's H-O-Y-T, F-O-N-G-E-R. I live at 18243 Lost Creek 12 Lane. 13 My question involves -- I've heard some talk about 14 easements and public funds. And up until just recently we've 15 had a little trouble with trespassing around the area there. 16 And law enforcement has pretty much taken care of it for us, 17 again just recently. 18 Does an easement -- is that -- would that involve like the road? 19 2.0 BOARD CHAIRPERSON BILL CARGO: The easement is 2.1 for -- I believe the easements we're talking about are for 22 storm water purposes, they're not for purposes of inviting 23 the public on to private land. 24 MR. HOYT FONGER: So there wouldn't be any roads or 25 anything?

BOARD CHAIRPERSON BILL CARGO: There won't be any 1 2 trapping or anything like that. This is not for public 3 access. It's for storm water maintenance purposes. 4 MR. HOYT FONGER: Perfect, thank you. BOARD CHAIRPERSON BILL CARGO: Last gentleman in 5 6 that row? Okay. 7 I'll go behind? Next to him? Nothing? The very far corner? 8 9 Then we have the very end? 10 I see a face that's familiar, no comments either. 11 Then at that stage we're going to close the public 12 comment portion of this public hearing and have some 13 discussions in the front. 14 And I'm going to digress just a little bit because 15 I hear the talk about beavers. And my favorite story about 16 the industrialness of beavers is when they plugged the little 17 Pigeon culvert, which is a big culvert in Grand Haven Township. And they had found a wooden pallet, and they were 18 19 able to use that wooden pallet to block an entire four-foot 2.0 culvert. 21 And that water went up very quickly and we were 22 wondering how they could do so quickly. They found a pallet, 23 pulled it over there, put it in the culvert and stopped 24 everything up. It's amazing how quickly water can rise when

you do something like that. So that's digressing quite a

25

bit. 1 2 Ken, do you have anything you want to add? 3 BOARD SECRETARY KEN SOUTER: No, other than I 4 appreciate all the comments that we've had. And I've heard 5 mostly positive comments on it. 6 I'm always in favor of drain districts to come 7 under the jurisdiction of the Ottawa County Drain Because then if there is a problem, anybody 8 Commissioner. 9 has a problem, they know who to call. And Joe can get out 10 there with -- he's got maintenance crews that he can hire to 11 get out there and fix it quickly. 12 So I'm always in favor of that. I'm in favor of 13 getting a good outlet and then securing an outlet for a 14 subdivision area like this. 15 So I'm a little concerned with not going all the 16 way to the far outlet, but if it's a natural watercourse, 17 that should take care of it. He can generally ask for 18 permission, somebody is not going to stop him from going in 19 there to pull out a tree or something like that. 2.0 So I'm in favor of getting these things under the 21 proper jurisdiction. 22 BOARD CHAIRPERSON BILL CARGO: Rich? 23 BOARD MEMBER RICH VANDERKLOK: Well I also 24 appreciate the comments that you folks have made. They've

been very helpful. And I appreciate your determination to

25

see something done.

2.0

And so I would agree with what Ken has said here.

And I too think that there is a need to bring this into

the -- as a drainage district under the auspices of the

Ottawa County Water Resources Commissioner.

BOARD CHAIRPERSON BILL CARGO: And I agree. I think that when you have these type of systems, whether it's in the street or whether it's the ponds or the connecting waterways, maintenance has to occur. The street pipes are going to become clogged with sedimentation over time with sand. You need to have somebody in there cleaning those out as necessary.

The only thing I would also encourage is that I hope that Spring Lake Township has a policy with regard to spending monies on minor maintenance, something less than maybe 10 thousand or 5 thousand so you don't have to go through the assessment process, which can be cumbersome and actually add costs.

So I would encourage that if you talk to anybody with the Spring Lake Township, make sure they have a policy in place, whether formal or informal.

But again, I have not heard anything today that would make me think that the orphan drain should not be brought under the public domain.

So I would like to hear if there is a motion to

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that regard as to the necessity of this, I would appreciate

The other thing I want to talk about is healthiness of the watershed, somebody asked that earlier. You have one of the best people in your district, Al Steinmam. If anybody knows about water quality, that guy is on top of it. Al and I have a great relationship.

If there is issues, I'm sure Al will bring those up to me. Al and I again have that relationship where we call each other, we talk and we work on multiple projects.

And the other part downstream, beavers are an issue in Ottawa County again this year, we have a lot of trappers out all over the County. So it's not just Spring Lake.

Lake levels are high in Spring Lake, and the other issue again I would just talk about the outlet with a lot of wetlands and a lot of jurisdiction that we probably didn't have over it anyway. So I just want to make sure that that's kind of understood today that wetlands I still have to get permits for that.

And I'm real sensitive to the environment. I've won a lot of awards so I'm not just going to come in and dig drains and cause erosion and take away some of your native plants. We're going to be really, really sensitive to any type of future maintenance project.

1	Either Mike or Marc will be fully aware of what
2	we're going to do. If you want me to come to one of your
3	evenings meetings like I've done in the past, I'm always
4	happy to come and share what the maintenance may look like
5	and have you guys be a part of it. Because it is your
6	community and I want to be sensitive to that.
7	So again, that's all I have.
8	Thanks again for your time this morning, and I
9	appreciate everyone being here.
10	BOARD CHAIRPERSON BILL CARGO: With that, I will
11	note if anybody wants a copy of the presentation, there is a
